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There is a sufprising yarlety of fish available. Considering the many restaurants which have speclalized in tish dishes, it is amazing that the homemaker has not copied more of their methods of cooking, serving and garnishing. Pethaps it is because fish is not very pleasant to handle and often leaves a strong odour. After handling fish, wash hands in strong salt water, rinse and then wash with soap. Also there are nir-deodorizers available which help to keep the air sweet throughout the cooking period. .
