VACATION DIARY

Mrs. Walter Diggins, who spent a holiday last month at Waubushene with Mrs. J. Sanford, Mrs. Ed. Sanford and son, has written an interesting diary of her visit, excerpts from which appear below:

We arrived at the cottage at 11.30 in the evening and after a lunch went to bed. Elide was up at five, as he had to return to work in Stewarttown and after he went off in the car I could not dream of sleeping, as the seagulls were screaming and flying around. I peeped out the bedroom window and the most beautiful sight met me. The sun peeping through the clouds and reflecting on the waters of the bay, and just a lively ripple. There was not a movement but nature's play in bed till six watching the grandeur of this perfect natural spot, the best I have ever seen in Canada. The drinking water here

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comes from a well about a quarter of an hour's walk. Tip toeing from the house I started on my first voyage, not a creature was stirring, the morning sun glistened on the water, the country lane winding along behind people's summer homes, the wild flowers so profuse and tall. As I walked along in that place of grandeur I thought, if it were possible for every child growing up today to spend the school holidays in such an environment and to know that when he was old enough to work, he could own a small portion of this "heaven," for such it is, I can assure you. I knocked at the door of a square white cottage and asked a dear little three-year-old where the well was. She called her dad, a fine young man of about 25, who took my water pail, guided me further up the road and filled my pail from the well with sparkling water. He carried it half way home for me and wished me a happy holiday. What an episode for an old lady nearly seventy at six-thirty in the morning. That pail of water was so light that I caught myself almost running. I was warmed and happy, and it made me feel like the song "Somebody's Mother". The rest of the day was spent in watching the changing scenes on the water, eating, laughing and sleeping. To bed at 9.30 and as I fell asleep I thought — may the family of fine men who thought to turn their land into such a paradise always know happiness and peace. I was fortunate in meeting some of that family, two sisters and their two brothers, whom I am sure have come from fine ancestors for the other ladies put one in mind of cameo brooches. They live in a fine home at the top of a hill which looks down on the cottages where the roof peep through the trees like yari-coloured jewels and beautiful Sturgeon Bay glows like a diamond in a frame of dark green velvet trees. I went to sleep to the soft voice of Lorraine reading her wee son a good night story, one of the sweetest sounds an old lady could hear, for it stirred memories of her own sons of thirty and forty years ago.

My second day in "paradise" we got up, cleaned house and started on foot for Waubushene. We walked along the railways tracks for a mile, and watched the boats here and there where people were fishing. Don't get the impression that this is a crowded holiday resort. It is only eleven years since the first cottage was built, and the fine family that opened this land up and made it possible for some folks to make their dreams come true do not wish it to become too thickly populated. Leaving the railway we walked down a winding road with raspberries growing along the roadside, big flat stones here & there where one could sit and rest if so minded. We talked of shows we had seen, of books and funny little anecdotes in our lives and before we knew it we were at the top of a big hill. I wish I had the gift to help you visualize the scene as we looked down on Waubushene. Lovely streets and homes, never too close to each other, gardens all well-tended and loved, streets spotless and folks all looked happy and glad to be alive. I can't tell you of the population or the industries as we only went to shop. Half a dozen smart shops, all modern and clean made our shopping trip a pleasure. I had asked the grocer to weigh my shopping bag — thirteen pounds not bad for an old lady nearly seventy to carry two miles home. We soon had a wood fire going at the cottage. A fire is always appreciated here at the cottage which stands almost on the edge of the bay, and there is plenty of driftwood and dead twigs to keep it going. Before we knew it, it was time again for bed.

Wednesday morning, and I cannot rest when I hear the seagulls and look at the picture through my bedroom window. By now I feel part of this peaceful little nest, for such it really is. At four, a message came inviting us to spend the evening with the family who own the land round about. How thrilled I was, for I was curious to peep at the setting of my "Dresden Ladies" and their brothers. The large house is situated on a hill overlooking the bay. As we walked a winding road leading to the house we circled a large lawn, and the ladies met us on the porch and ushered us into a wonderful drawing room. Works of art were scattered around on tables. There were paintings of neighbouring beauty spots. Carpets and furniture spoke of the refinement of that family. I had read about such things but I never had visited such a grand place. The mother of this wonderful family died just two years ago at the age of 91. Her wedding dress and other articles have been given to the Midland Museum, there to be treasured for all time. The parents were pioneers here and started a lumber business where many people were employed until

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fire destroyed the mill. Now the wharfs are drifting away more each year, the older people who were employed there have passed on to their reward, and these sisters and brothers think this beauty spot must be kept peaceful and happy in remembrance of those who have gone before. I learned that this part of this grand old world used to be called Tannerville after the family name. Midnight came and one of the brothers handed us a lighted lantern to guide us home, and another lovely vacation day ended.
