Recent visitors in Glen Williams were Mr. and Mrs. Reg Williams and Mrs. William Jones and daughter Joan, on a visit to Canada from Wales. Mrs. Jones operates a 300 acre farm near Cardiff on which is grown each year 60 acres of potatoes and 60 to 70 acres of cabbage, nearly all of the Savoy type. She employs a staff of 12 regular hands besides casual labour, for each of which she pays nearly \$2.50 a week for health insurance. Her bill for commercial fertilizers this year was well over two thousand pounds.
