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The Raiders barely came out alive in the fifth game of the Intermediate B baseball finals, played in Fergus last Wednesday evening. Georgetown finally broke the deadlock by taking out a very close win. It looked dark for Georgetown in the 1st, 3rd, 4th, 5th and 9th innings when the bases were loaded with the exception of the 5th and 9th when only second and third bases were occupied, by Fergus runners. Each time this happened Chappel pitched himself out of trouble by forcing them to hit or striking them out. The first run was scored in the top half of the third inning when Cliff Norton, playing third base for Georgetown, came through with a single. Dillon the next batter had the bunt sign flashed to him. Warner on third for Fergus handled a beautiful bunt well, made a good throw to second in order to cut off Norton, but baseman Miller was not on the job and failed to touch the bag. He made a bad throw to Homer at first to let the runners advance an extra base. Right fielder Ev Wilson hit safely to score Norton. Storey went out on a fielder's choice. Spud Patterson grounded to Warner at home who threw to the plate successfully to cut Dillon off.

Fergus were still unable to score although a walk to Seaman, the catcher, loaded the bases. With two away, Homer, who hits a long ball, was sent down via the strike-out route by Chappel. Georgetown added another run in the fourth when Scotty Patterson and George Chaplin both hit safely. On Chaplin's hit with two away, Patterson slid safely into home plate. Norton grounded out to retire the side.

To start the bottom half of the fourth Crystal grounded out. Miller walked, Moon McMullen hit a hot one to Norton who juggled the ball enough to allow both runners to pull up safely. Utley hit a grounder to Storey who fielded the ball well, but a bad toss to Gibson for a double play ball allowed Miller to score the first Fergus run, leaving McMullen on third and Utley on second. Chappel then struck out Red Dubrick and Lyle "Lighthouse" Utley in order to retire the side with Georgetown leading 2-1. With Dillon grounding out to start off the fifth, Wilson hit a sharp single to right field. Storey came through with a triple, scoring Wilson to make it 3-1. Spud Patterson then grounded out and Gibson went down swinging. Moon McMullen was pitching fine ball and was being well supported. Georgetown were backing up Chappel to the limit and tension was mounting in the game. Chappel loaded the bases when Warner singled, Seaman drew a walk. Home struck out and Crystal was hit by a pitched ball. Miller was forced to hit one up in the air that Harvey Chappel took and then Moon McMullen hit a long fly ball that looked like it was in there for extra bases. Dillon seemed to misjudge it but he finally pulled it down to avert disaster and to retire the side. In the 6th inning both sides were retired in order! Going into the seventh the Raiders again went down 1, 2, 3. Homer led off in the bottom of the seventh for Fergus by hitting a long fly ball that Dillon had to chase hard and couldn't quite hang on to; this put Homer on third with none away. The next two batters went down in order. Rango Moon McMullen came to bat and came through with a single to score Homer. F. Utley popped one to short right field that Storey and Wilson failed to call and let it drop for a base hit. Dubrick then hit to Chappel to retire the side.

With darkness closing in fast

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Storey hit a single. Spud Patterson hit a long fly ball. Storey overran second base and after the catch had been made was trapped when the throw went back to first base. Gibson then singled, stole second and Scotty Patterson filed out.

In the bottom of the eighth Fergus went down 1, 2, 3.

With the crowd on edge going into the ninth Chappel struck out. Chaplin grounded out. Norton was hit by pitched ball, Dillon walked, Wilson filed out.

The packed stands were on their feet as Fergus were taking their last trip to the plate. Crystal started off the Fergus half of the ninth with a single and made second on Dillon's fumbling in centre field. Miller walked. McMullen popped out. Crystal stole third. Miller went to second and the tying and winning runs were on base if short stop Red Dubrick could come through in the pinch. Dubrick at bat saw Crystal coming fast for home, bunted, Crystal crossed the plate but Chappel fielding the bunt perfectly threw to Patterson at first base to retire the side and give Georgetown their second game.

After the game we found out Crystal took it upon himself to try and steal home. Dubrick realizing this immediately thought he hadn't seen the bunt signal flashed so took it upon himself to drop a short one which was their undoing. Chappel and McMullen both went the nine innings.

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FERGUS 12 - GEORGETOWN 12
 What looked to be at the outset a run-away for Fergus in the sixth game of the series in the Inter-county Baseball League championship played here Saturday, turned out to be one of the best games of the series. Fergus have now evened the series with two wins and a tie. The seventh game will be played in Fergus tonight.

Coach Scotty Patterson decided on working Don Herrington Saturday, while Moon McMullen, who has pitched every game so far in the series for Fergus was given the chance again. Right from the start things looked black for Georgetown. In the top half of the first clean-up hitter Bill Warner, peppery third baseman, teed off an inside pitch of Herrington's for a four bagger with two teammates aboard. Kenny Nash brightened things up a little by slamming a triple with one on. Before the inning ended Georgetown had added another. Fergus were getting to Herrington and they made their hits count for six runs, so in the third Scotty Patterson was forced to pull Herrington in favor of himself. Gibson went in to catch, Storey went to short and Herrington went to second base. By the time Fergus had finished with the offerings of Coach Patterson it looked as if it wouldn't be worth waiting around for the finish. Some of the customers were going home, when Chappel was called from first to take over the mound duties. From the fifth inning on it was a different ball game and it was a different ball team, and if Crystal had not made that running one-handed catch of
