Open Letter to Citizens of Georgetown

Georgetown, Ont., September 12, 1949.

To All Citizens of the Town of Georgetown:

We the executive of Branch 120, Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L. on behalf of the members of Branch 120, wish to record our strongest objections to the dictatorial attitude taken by members of Georgetown Council in regard to the position of Town Assessor, recently become vacant through the resignation of assessor J. Arnold Early.

The Legion, as spokesman for ALL veterans, feel that the position should have been advertised fully, applications called for, and discussed at a later meeting.

As most citizens will recall at the conclusion of World War II, the then incumbent Council passed a By-Law stating veterans should be given every consideration for any vacant municipal position. It was felt by the Council of that period (and we believe by the citizens of Georgetown at large) that in view of the unselfish services of these men to country and municipality during 1939 to 1945, that it was only fair and just that the municipality should give preferential treatment to any veteran who was qualified for a vacant town position.

Therefore, Branch 120, Canadian Legion, request that Council immediately reconsider their decision of Monday, September 6th, and call for applications from all interested in the position of Town assessor.

The Legion, as a body, has endeavoured to keep out of municipal politics, but, feel under the circumstances that they would serve the best interests of this Town by taking a strong stand in what they consider a highly deplorable affair.
