THE GEORGETOWN UNITED CHURCH

Regular morning worship was conducted in the United Church on Sunday by the minister, Rev. J. M. Smith. The lesson was read from 1 Kings 19:9-18 and the text from Isaiah 1:9 and Romans 11:5. Mr. Smith speaking on the subject "The Remnant" illustrated how God in times past had used "The Remnant" in the advancement of his glorious and victorious cause. The remnant in every age, including our own, it was declared, must face the opposition of anti-Christian doctrines and the indifference and inactivity of professing Christians.
