HOME ECONOMIST

Although rosst turkey or baked ham is traditional fare for Thanksgiving, a delicious fried chicken, served with spoon bread, sweet potatoes and Harvard beets is a main course suggestion. Carrot pudding with old English Hard sauce is a dessert fit for such a festive meal.

FRIED. CHICKEN

Clean chicken and cut into pieces. Salt, place in an earthenware dish and let stand overnight in the refrigerator, Drain, roll in flour and place in a heavy aluminum or iron frying pan in which 34 cup et shortening has been melted. Fryquickly until both sides are browned. Then add one cup of boiling water and cover with a tight lid and cook over low heat for one hour. Cream Gravy: Remove chicken from skillet, stir in flour (use proportions of 2 tablespoons flour to two tablespoons dripping). Stir in 1 cup milk (for each and cook 2 tbsps. flour used) until thick. 'Season with salt, pepper and summer savoury.

SPOON BREAD

1. Mix together 1 cup sifted corn neal, 1 tsp. salt.


