

**Bowling Leagues Swing Into Fall Season At Lucky Strike**

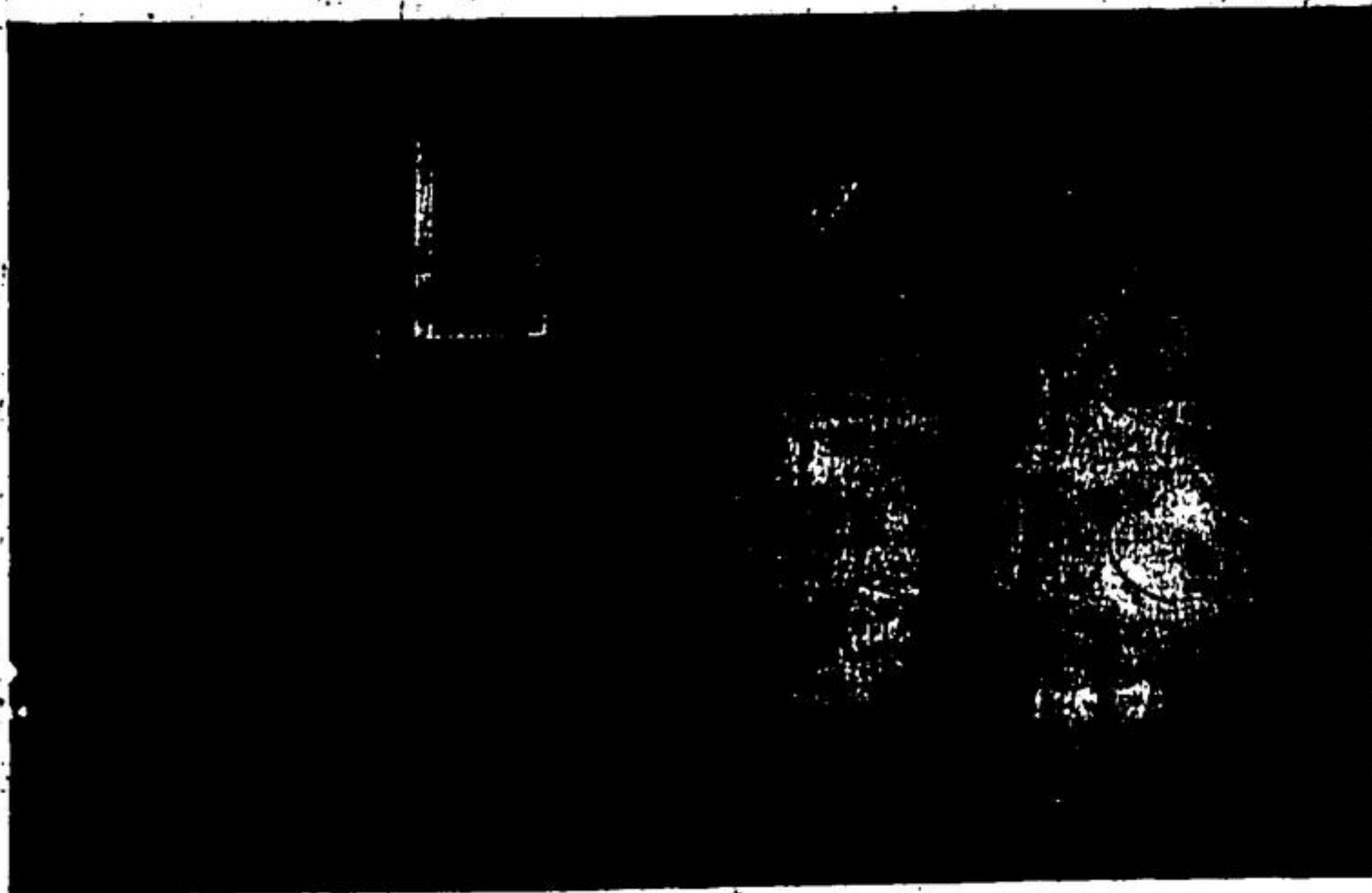

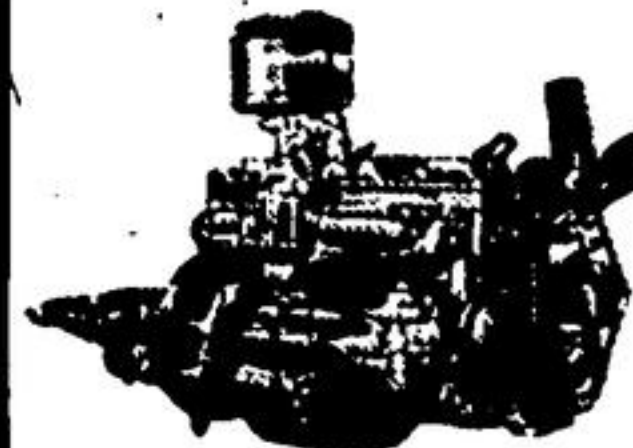
