What Council Did

ON THURSDAY, OCTOBER 6th

A special meeting was held last Thursday morning by council to discuss with Mr. Roberts, the wattrworks engineer, the serious situation which has arisen in town due to the depletion of the present water supply. Acting mayor Jack Armstrong said that there were two matters of paramount importance, the maintenance of adequate supplies to keep industry going and for fire protection, and coupled with this was the fact that the Board of Parks Management had planned to flood the arena last week-end. This latter was important from a financial standpoint as it would mean decreased revenue for the publicly-owned building. Cr. Herbert said that the fire brigade had offered to pump water from the creek if this would help but while council thought this would be an excellent idea to provide the surface ice, it would not be possible to keep pumping the large quantities needed to keep the freezing unit in operation. The Milton Arena, it was reported, had used 65,000 gallons of water every 24 hours while it was operating last summer.
