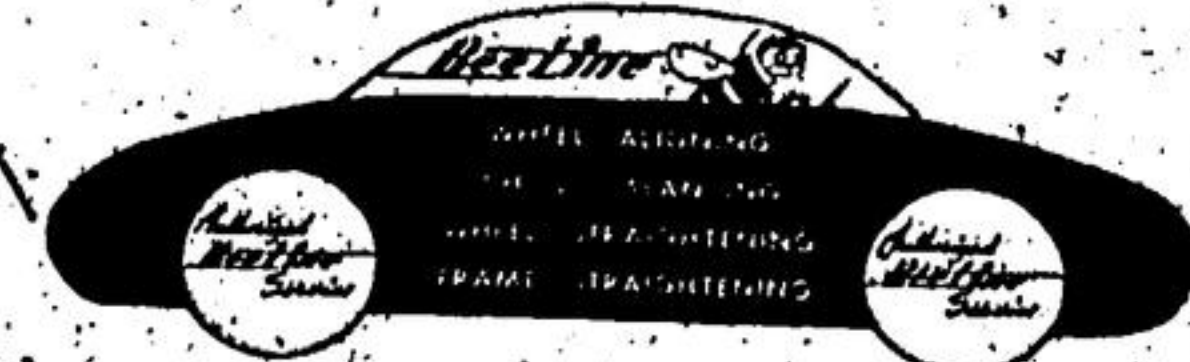
MIXMASTER IS AMONG BIRTHDAY GIFTS
