Korean Student is Guest of W.M.S.

The Autumn Thankoffering meeting of The Women's Missionary Society of the Georgetown United Church was held in the auditorium of the Church on Tuesday, October 11th at 3 o'clock. The president, Mrs. R. C. Adams, was in the chair. The Devotional was in charge of Mrs. Houston, who gave a most helpful talk on "Thanksgiving - pointing out how thankful we should be for the good things in our lives and also for the hardships - the sorrows, the disappointments, the criticisms that come to us. They can all develop our characters and teach us valuable lessons."

Mrs. Francis Thompson sang the beautiful sacred song - "Beside The Still Waters He leadeth My Soul." The pastor, Rev. John M. Smith introduced the speaker - Miss Yong Oon Kim from Korea. She was one of the leaders at Ryerson Summer Camp where Mr. Smith was in charge this summer. Miss Kim won all the audience by her pleasing personality - gentle and serious. She is taking her last year in Theology at Emmanuel College and is the only woman student from Korea in Canada. She gave us a sketch of her life from childhood up to the present. She had no knowledge of Jesus Christ until she went to Sunday School at eleven years of age. She was not converted until she attended the "Church of Christ in Korea" at 16. In the intervening years she had no certainty, no security, no purpose in life. Her continual prayer was - "If there is a God, reveal Thyself to me" The refrain - "Jesus loves Me This I Know" repeated itself in her mind. She was captured by the love of Christ, studied her Bible and found the answers to her questions. She has committed herself to the service of her Redeemer. Her face shows the peace and joy which she has found. She hopes to return to Korea at the end of her year, where she will teach Theology to her people. Mrs. Robert Jones moved a vote of thanks to Miss Kim and to all who took part in the program. Mr. Smith closed the meeting with prayer and pronounced the benediction. A social hour with refreshments was then enjoyed.

The church was decorated by the members of the 50-50 club with fruits, flowers and vegetables with a background of autumn leaves. The lesson was read from Phil 4:4-13 and the message was entitled "Thanks Be to God." Mr. Smith stressed the note that life was a cooperative venture and that every man, whatever his vocation, ought to be thankful to God for the opportunity to toil, the strength to toil, and the fruits of toil. The choir, under the direction of Miss Lynda Stewart sang the anthem "O Come Let us Sing Unto the Lord" - Caleb Simper and the offertory "A Prayer of Thanksgiving." The evening service was opened by the singing of several well-known hymns. Mr. Smith's message was entitled "Christ Liveth in Me" and was the fourth in a series of studies based on Paul's letter to the Galatians.

HIGH PRICES FOR CANADIAN HOLSTEINS IN SOUTH AMERICA Two Canadian bred Holstein bulls exported to South America have been resold at exceptionally high prices. They are Glenafton Rag Apple Alert who brought the equivalent of \$27,500 in Canadian funds and Glenafton Rag Apple Monogram who sold for the equivalent of \$25,000. "Alert" had twice been named All-Canadian and All-American before being exported to Adolfo Jaramillo, Santiago, Chile. Mr. Jaramillo purchase him for \$11,500, top price at the 1947 All-Canadian Sale, from his joint owners R. H. McElquham, Lunark and J. J. E. McCague, Alliston, Ont. He was subsequently Grand Champion at the top Chilean Show at Santiago. Glenafton Rag Apple Monogram was privately sold to El India Soc. Anonima, Buenos Aires in 1948 by Harold Bingham & Son, Georgetown, Ont. He has been classified as XXX the highest classification attainable for type. An estimated \$18,851.00 is needed.
