Further Word From Ottawa to Family of Glen RCAF Casualty

Last week a letter was received by Mr. William Beaumont of Glen Williams from the RCAF Casualties Officer in Ottawa giving further word about his son, Flight Sergeant Lawrence Herbert Beaumont, who lost his life on air operations against the enemy February 3rd, 1945. The letter quoted from a report recently received from the Missing Research and Enquiry Service and said in part: "The report states that investigating officers have located the graves of four members of the crew. Contrary to the French Red Cross report forwarded to you in 1946 which stated that four crew members were buried in Buchenau, the graves of only two members of the crew, Flying Officer Armstrong and Flight Sergeant Johnson were located in this cemetery. The graves of Sergeant Balloch and Flight Lieutenant Gallivan were located in the cemetery at Staffort. These four have now been moved to the permanent British Military Cemetery at Bad Tolz, 28 miles south east of Munich, Germany. Although this area has now been swept by search teams of our Missing Research and Enquiry Service, no trace could be found of your son, Sergeant Bowden and Flight Sergeant Dufresne. Unhappily owing to the extreme hazards attending war in the air there are many thousands of aircrew boys who, like your son, do not have a known grave and their names will be commemorated on general memorials, which will be erected by the Imperial War Grave Commission". Mr. Beaumont has also received five medals awarded to this young airman who gave his life in the war. The medals include the 1939-1945 Star and the France & Germany Star.

Public School Students Receive Free Dental Care, School Board Decides

Free dental treatment for public school children in Georgetown will be provided by the Board of Education. It was decided at the Board meeting last Wednesday evening at the High School. The treatment will tie in with the examinations which will be made of all school children by the new Health Unit dentist, Dr. O'Meara, who expects to start his clinics in Georgetown late this year.

Halton has been selected as a sample county for a dental study by the Federal Government, and while Dr. O'Meara will work under the county health unit his expenses will be paid by the dominion government. His work will consist of examination and recommendation only and he will do no actual work on children's teeth. The majority of Esquering Township children, those who attend schools administered by the township school area, have already had the advantage of this system for a year. The Georgetown board felt that to carry out an examination system to yield the best results, dental treatment should be provided. This will consist mainly of extractions and fillings and parents will be able to send their children to any dentist of their choice, the dentists receiving a straight hourly payment for their services. Estimated on the basis of Esquering's experience last year, the cost to the taxpayer will be in the neighbourhood of \$1000 yearly, as a government grant is received on money expended.

An increase in fire insurance on the public school is being considered and Sam Mackenzie was hired to make a valuation of the building. The last valuation made was in 1935, when the building was considered to be worth \$55,000. At present insurance of \$47,000 is carried on the building and \$4,000 on equipment. The type of insurance in-

force requires that the building be insured at least .80 per cent of its value and should a serious fire occur, the taxpayers would be heavy losers if less insurance were carried. The secretary, James F. Evans, reported that he had been in touch with the Fire Marshal's Office in Toronto, asking that a man be sent out to inspect the building and recommend measures for better fire exits from the second floor. He had been told that as there were two stairways from upstairs, there was no great danger, but that someone would come out for another examination.

A request from Miss Rowena Stull, occasional teacher at the school, for a revision in salary rate, came before the board. She had been receiving \$4 for half days and \$7 for full days and these rates were increased to \$5 and \$8. The board congratulated Principal Howard Wrigglesworth of the public school on completing a course of studies leading to his B.A. degree from McMaster University and Alan Prouse, physical training teacher at the high school who had completed a course in Toronto this summer to obtain his specialist certificate. Their salaries were increased \$100 and \$50 respectively for their extra-qualifications.

M. H. Moyer, attendance officer, was present at the meeting to discuss with the board situations arising from the granting of work permits to boys under 16. Some of those who had been granted permits, it was felt, were creating dissatisfaction among other boys still in school and Mr. Moyer was instructed to visit these boys if necessary and point out that permits could be revoked at any time, and that they could be made to return to school if their conduct was not satisfactory. A \$15 donation was made to the Poppy Day fund. A new blackboard was ordered for a room at the public school at a cost of approximately \$300.

Should finances permit, further improvements may be made to the high school building during the Christmas holidays. Congratulations were expressed by the chairman, Walter Blehn, to the high school students and their coaches, Miss Rose Piercey and Mr. Prouse for their good showing in winning the inter-school track met at Erin.
