It was a long trek — but they made it in an unbelievably short time, and saw all the sights as well. We're speaking of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Tighe, and another couple, who together completed a Californian motor trip of 6,300 miles in 14 days, on \$100.00 in gas and oil plus an average of \$100.00 per person for other expenses. Mr. Tighe, who is a member of the Smith & Stone Ltd. office staff, and Mrs. Tighe and daughter Dianne, live in part of Lieut. Col. G. O. Brown's house, just outside the town limits, opposite the Golf Course. Mr. Tighe made his trip fit into his annual vacation, and in writing in to tell us about it, did such a good job that we cannot improve upon it, so from here on, he will tell you just how they accomplished the trip, in his own words.

Leaving Georgetown at 2.30 p.m. the 1st September, we drove 1,000 miles to the Ozarks of Oklahoma by 6.00 p.m. the 2nd September, driving all night and day. Not feeling as tired as one might expect, having naps in the car en route, we drove all that night and the following day through Texas and New Mexico arriving in Phoenix, Arizona, Sunday night the 4th September, having completed 2,400 miles. After spending 3 days with relatives in Yuma, Arizona, on the border of Mexico (which was visited) and California, we drove to San Diego on the 8th September and visited the Naval Station, viewing aircraft carriers, battleships, etc. That night we headed for Los Angeles, stopping at Laguna Beach for the night. On Friday, the 9th September, we entered Los Angeles and spent the day in Hollywood seeing all the spots made famous by the Stars. An impressive sight was the panoramic view of Los Angeles by night from Sunset Strip, the millions of lights spread out like a carpet as far as the eye could see. Saturday, the 10th September, we drove to Las Vegas, Nevada, where big time gambling from Roulette, throw dice, Faro and Blackjack to Bingo is legal and most popular. Evidence of their profits are the elaborately furnished and decorated hotels and gambling resorts which even the movies fail to amplify enough. We left Las Vegas in time to see Boulder Dam before dark and then, while illuminated, that night was spent in Kingman, Arizona, and Sunday we drove around the Grand Canyon which defies description. Feeling that the most interesting sights were behind, we settled down for the return trip and again drove two nights and two days, arriving in Chicago Tuesday night, the 13th September. From there to Detroit took a day and after a night in Detroit we drove home on the 14th day, Thursday, the 15th September. Had we not sent post-cards to friends en route, we would never have dared to tell anyone that we drove so far, saw so much, on so little money in such a short time.
