Pueblo Followed Pitheusa, Archaeologists Discover. To a world threatened with having to go underground to escape from atomic bombs, bacterial warfare and other predicted horrors, Dr. Paul S. Martin, anthropologist digging up prehistoric sites in New Mexico for Chicago Natural History museum, brings news of early Americans who about A. D. 1000 began to occupy what were to them "the new-fangled surface houses or pueblos" which at that time began to appear. In his latest report on the work of the southwest archaeological expedition to Col. Clifford C. Gregg, director of the museum, Dr. Martin tells of discovering that the first pueblos in southwestern New Mexico began to appear around A. D. 1000 when they were only one-story structures of stone and mud mortar. Contrasted to them is the largest Indian house of the older type - the underground pitheusa - that Dr. Martin has uncovered some nine miles south of Reserve, N. M., on a low ridge sparsely sprinkled with live oak and piñon trees. "This mammoth ancient Indian house, termed a pitheusa in archeological jargon (a cellar with a roof), measures approximately 28 by 28 feet and is about four feet deep," writes Leonard G. Johnson, a member of the expedition personnel of some 15 men. "At least a thousand years old, it has many features that should interest the layman as well as the archeologist. This biggest pitheusa was the latest development of the pitheusa tradition. It was the last word in pitheusas since it probably had to compete with the new-fangled surface houses - the pueblos."

Too Much Room in Kitchen May Mean Many Extra Steps. If you feel like you've been on a 20-mile hike at the end of the day, Mrs. Homemaker, maybe it's because your kitchen is too large. Miss Gladys Ward, home management specialist at the University of Illinois college of agriculture, advises you to check up on how well the size of your kitchen fits your family needs. Of course the size of your family, how much work you do in the kitchen, and the equipment used must all be considered. Study your kitchen equipment and how it's lined up around the room. Is there more than enough space between range, refrigerator, and sink? You want enough room at each for working and for storage of supplies and utensils. But too much room means extra steps. If your kitchen is too large, there are ways to improve it. One way is to group range, sink, refrigerator and work counters close together in a compact working space. Then use the rest of the room for dining or for a business center of whatever you need. Sometimes you can bring the work centers closer together by moving one piece of equipment from a far wall out into the room near the other pieces. Join it to a counter or work surface.

Foot-and-Mouth Disease. Fears that wild animals may be spreading foot-and-mouth disease in Mexico appear to be without foundation, according to a report made public by the American Veterinary Medical association. In response to a request from a special committee of the veterinary association, the U. S. bureau of animal industry began a study in Mexico to find out whether wild animals are harboring and spreading the disease to farm livestock. There was no evidence that wild animals are affected, the report said. Pointing out that several species of wildlife, including deer, are highly susceptible to foot-and-mouth disease, the AVMA said that "its spread to these species would play havoc with present efforts to stamp out the infection." Washing Nylon Sweaters. Big advantage of nylon sweaters is, they can be washed and dried without being blocked. Some tips about care of nylon sweaters come from Miss Edna Gray, clothing specialist, University of Illinois college of agriculture. Wash the sweater in sudsy, warm water, having water the same temperature used for wool sweaters. Rinse, thoroughly, then roll it in a towel to remove excess moisture. To dry, put the sweater on a smooth wood or plastic clothes hanger or a padded hanger; this will shape the shoulders. Nylon is damaged easily by heat. A nylon sweater will dry faster than wool, but not as fast as nylon hose. Safety for Night Drivers. As a safety measure for night driving, two flashlights are better than one. One flashlight is a must for use in changing tires and making roadside repairs. The second is just as important for use by a driver's companion stationed at 50 yards or more to the rear of a stalled car, to warn off approaching traffic. The lack of a suitable warning light in the rear is a frequent cause of accidents to tire-changing motorists who could not be seen by approaching cars until too late for them to veer off.
