 Two Jersey cows in the herd of Lloyd Crichton, Georgetown, have been awarded silver medal certificates by the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club. Norval Marquis Lady 180078, went on test as a senior three-year-old and in 365 days produced 12,050 lbs. of milk, and 677 lbs. of fat with a test of 5.16 per cent. Norval Sybil's Favorite Lady — 172872 — went on test as a junior two-year-old and in 365 days produced 9,466 lbs. of milk, 640 lbs. of fat with a test of 6.76 per cent in 365 days. Both these high producing cows were bred by Peter A. Dick of Brampton.
