

# What Council Did

Accepted a tender from Jones G.H., Acton contractors, for building of a solid brick pump-house at the new town water source at Main Street South, at a cost of \$3,500.

Moved by Herbert and McCumber, seconded by McNally and Lyons voting against.

Tender was also received from local firm of Hawes & Nelson at \$3,700. Mr. McNally favoured because he said they were local men and hired local help. Cr. Davidson said the town was in a poor position and the new water supply must be used as soon as possible. The Acton tender was for the engineer's estimate and

followed specifications exactly and he favoured it. Cr. Herbert said solid brick would be a more reliable and better building, and Cr. Hill also said he thought the engineer's advice should be followed.

Discussed sewerage costs, and found that with the final bills in the cost would be about \$35,000 higher than the original contract price of \$375,000. About \$8,000 of this is due to road work which had to be done, and on which the government will pay no subsidy. \$500 is for a sewerage extension to Fred Harrison's property on the highway. A special meeting will be held as soon as the exact amount of road expenditures is known and permission sought from the Municipal Board to issue further debentures to meet this cost.

Will replace 45 feet of the in front of Charles Parker's driveway on Joseph Street.

(Moved by McNally and Hill. Davidson voted against).

Mr. Parker appeared before council and said that he had offered to move the tile before sewerage was placed along the street but had been told by the construction men that it would not be necessary. Later he found all the tile completely broken.

Will ask local doctors to notify the town clerk when indigent patients in their care are admitted to hospital. Deputy-Reeve Goodlet said that at the last meeting of county council this had been discussed and it was felt that doctors might be inclined at times to send these patients to hospital when it was not altogether necessary, add-

ing to the expenses of municipalities. Burlington had cut down on such expenses by this method. Council felt that it was not proper to have a doctor ask for an OK before sending a patient to hospital but considered the information useful, as the town would know what bills to expect. On various occasions bills have been sent from hospitals and it was later found that the patient had arranged payment himself.

Passed an amendment to the building by-law providing that council, on a special application, may allow building on lots originally laid out at 40 feet or more. (The original by-law states that no building may be erected on a lot with less than 50 feet frontage).

Granted permission to Richard Hawes to erect a house on a 40 foot corner lot on Ostrander Boulevard, subject to the granting of a permit by the building inspector. (Moved by McNally and McCumber).

Were told in a letter from Provincial Police Commissioner Stringer that the department does not favour the use of a stop watch to check speeders and that the traffic inspector would discuss the problem further with local Constable Sheffield.

Granted \$25.00 to the Poppy Day Fund. (Moved by Davidson and Hill).

Refused to accept responsibility for a motor failure at the John St. pump-house which had cost \$201 to repair, claiming that this was Scott, Jackson's responsibility under the one-year guarantee and ordered the bill sent to them.

Filed a letter for consideration by next year's council from Halton

Will not instal water service to Mr. Schofield's property behind Normandy Boulevard unless he pays 90 per cent of the diggings and pipe line from the town line to the edge of his property. (Moved by Davidson and Herbert).

It was estimated that the cost of this service would be \$350 which was out of proportion to normal costs.

Asked the hydro to provide a new street light on Draper Street.
