NEW WATER SYSTEM DRAWS FIRE OF RATEPAYERS

lions of water daily. If given a chance to run free.

The chairman gave it as the opinion of the executive that any shortcomings in council could be blamed only on the electors themselves. It is the electors who must choose the men they think best fitted for the job and then get out and vote for them. Mr. Bell suggested that recriminations be kept to a minimum and that the association should look to the future rather than to keep harking back to the past.

Dean Harley suggested that no remuneration be made to council, which would eliminate any suggestion of councillors running for office with the object of "getting something out of it."

It was agreed that when councillors are selected for committees consideration should be given to their qualifications for handling the various technical duties. Ex-Mayor Joseph Gibbons explained the method by which committees are selected. The mayor draws up a list of chairmen and members of the different departments and submits this list to council who can in turn approve, reject or alter the list and committeemen can state their choice or objection toward the constitution of any particular committee. It was also made clear that the 1950 council would be chosen on the ward system. If the electors should vote in favour of choosing council by general vote, this will take effect in the 1951 elections.

Jack Gunning suggested that consideration be given to having a full-time consulting engineer to advise on technical questions. If the cost were too heavy, Georgetown could possibly interest neighbouring communities in sharing his services and salary, as is done by Burlington, Oakville, Bronte and Clarkson.

There were about one hundred people at the meeting, representing a fair cross section of the community. Secretary Frank Petch reported that there had been no correspondence addressed to the association since the previous meeting, in spite of a request that any "beefs" be sent in.

Dean Harley expressed concern about school children being endangered when crossing the intersection of Guelph and John Streets. It was resolved to take the matter up with the town council and ask to have a crossing policeman on hand at the busy time.

A somewhat involved argument took place regarding the duties of the executive in implementing approved resolutions and it was finally decided that action would be taken insofar as was practicable, but if any major changes were necessary in the original resolution, such changes would be reported to the association before action was taken.

Fred Harrison moved that council be approached to speed construction of a sidewalk along the highway to Normandy Boulevard and this was approved.
