**Dedicate Memorial Room At the United Church**

A service of special interest was held in the Georgetown United Church on Sunday when the members of the Georgetown Council, Branch 120, Canadian Legion and the Lorne Scots Band attended Divine Worship. During the service a Book of Remembrance, the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Alex MacLaren, was dedicated to the glory of God and for the purpose of recording current and historic information concerning persons and events important in the life of the congregation. The Memorial Room which has been built at the rear of the church was dedicated to the glory of God and the memory of those who paid the supreme sacrifice in World Wars 1 and 2, and to the memory of those women, laymen, and ministers who faithfully served the church in years past.

The Colours of the 76th Battalion, World War 1, which were consecrated and deposited within the church for safe keeping on Feb. 4th, 1917, were removed from their place on the wall and placed in the Memorial Room by the proper military procedure. The Colours were transferred by Capt. Paul Barber and escort of the Lorne Scots (Peel, Dufferin and Halton Regiment) and were passed to the Memorial Room through the hands of Mrs. James Ballantine, wife of the late Col. James Ballantine who was the commanding officer of the Battalion.

The service was conducted by Rev. John M. Smith, whose message referred to the costly sacrifice made by men and women in two World Wars in order that freedom and our way of life might be preserved. He urged that we realize that if a thing is worth "dying for" it is worth "living for" and that we take seriously the challenge of St. Paul to "present our bodies as living sacrifices, holy and acceptable unto God" and thus attain true freedom and true Christian democracy and brotherhood.

The choir under the direction of Miss Lynda Stewart sang the anthem "Let Us Forget". Mr. A. Tost singing the solo parts.

Two vases of roses were on the Communion Table. One vase contained a rose for each man of the congregation who had paid the supreme sacrifice in World War 1 and the other vase a rose for each of the men who made a similar sacrifice in World War 2.

The evening worship was conducted by the minister whose message was a continuation of the study in Galatians with special emphasis on two themes "Sons, not servants" and "Enemies" for the

truth's sake". Miss Betty King was pianist for the service in the absence of Miss L. Stewart and the choir who were providing music for the Melville Church Anniversary.
