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

## Dedicate Memorial Room At the United Church

A service of special nterest was held in the Georgetown United Church on Sunday when the members of the Georgetown Council, Branch 120, Canadian Legion and the Lorne Scots, Band attended Divine Worship. During the service a Book of Remembrance, the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Muclaren, was dedicated to the glory of God and for the purpose of recording current and historic information concerning persons and events. in portant in the life, of the con-

regation. The Memorial Room which has been built at the rear of the church was dedicated to the glory of God and the memory of those who paid the supreme sacrice in World Wars 1 and 2, and to the memory of those women, laymen, and ministers who faithfully served the church in years

The Colours of the 76th Batta-Don, World War 1, which were conecrated and deposited within the church for safe keeping on Feb. 4th, 1917, were removed from their place on the wall and placed in the Memorial Room by the proper military procedure . The Colours were transferred by Capt.
