PUBLIC SCHOOL NEWS

Former India Teacher Speaks at Ballinafad

Miss Joan Donaldson, attractively garbed in a blue sari, was speaker at a sectional meeting of Halton Presbytery of the Women's Missionary Society in Ballinafad United Church last Thursday afternoon. Miss Donaldson, now of St. Giles United Church, Hamilton, was formerly a teacher in the mission school in Hat Pipila, India. She told of the work as she had known it in the school. Not only do the missionaries teach in the schools, but for three months each year they go on tour, making their headquarters in a village, then travelling by ox-cart to outlying places. The listeners were much impressed by the obstacles encountered and overcome by these courageous men and women of the Cross in their efforts to bring the gospel of salvation to the Indian villagers and by the changed lives of the people after they have accepted this gospel for their own.

The theme of the day was "Advance Together" and it was encouraging to learn through the reports of various organizations how WMS work had advanced during the year. Mrs. W. N. Brownridge presided and conducted the business of the morning. This included reports from nine auxiliaries, one mission circle, six baby bands, six mission bands and three CGIT'S. Departmental conferences brought the morning's business to a close.

Mrs. E. B. Clements, literature secretary for the presbytery, also spoke in the afternoon, stressing the importance of the written word in arousing interest in missionary work. She gave a synopsis of some of the new books and urged members to read more of these.
