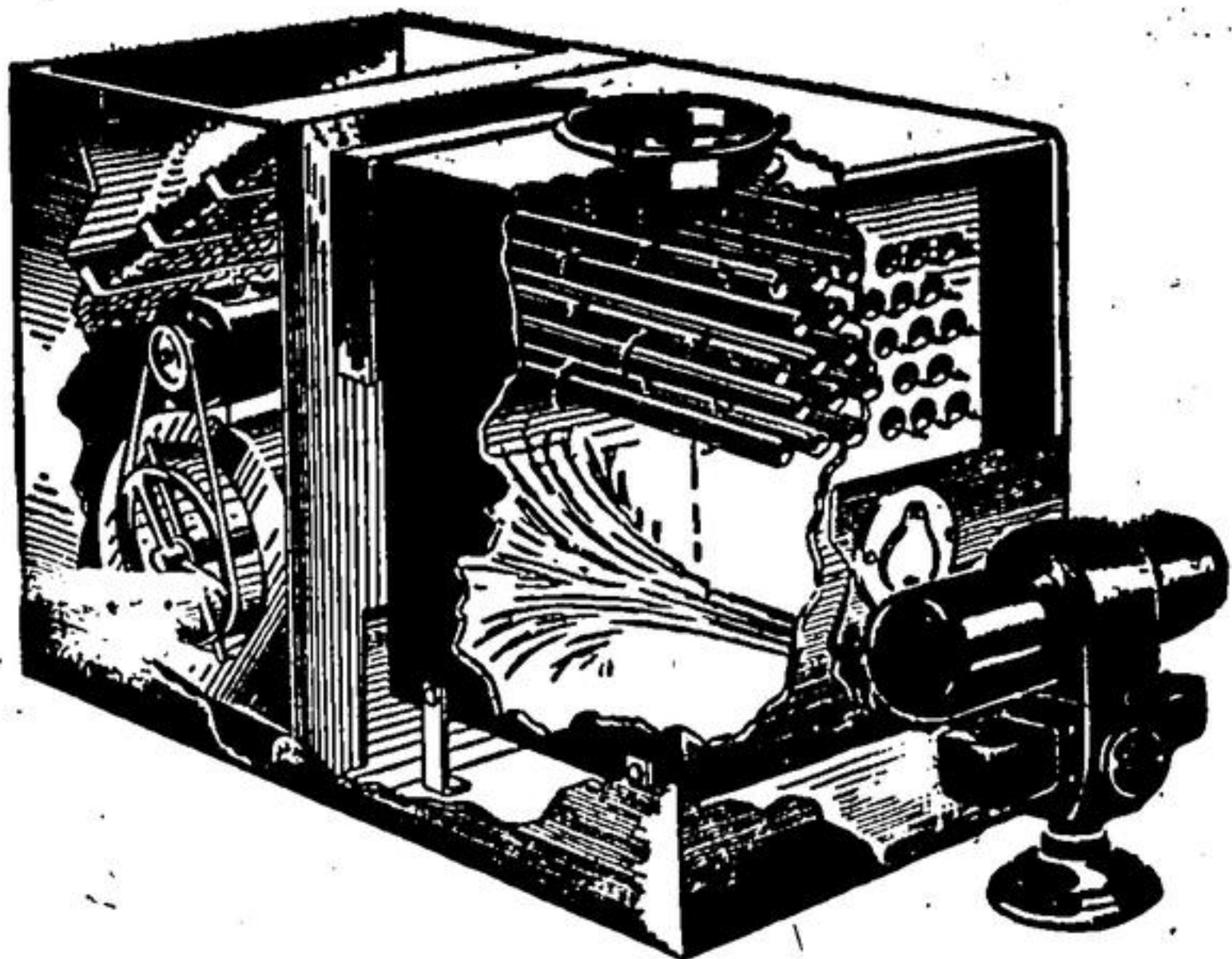

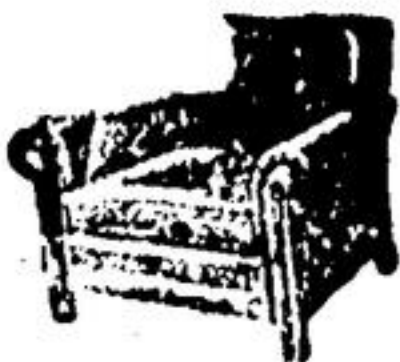

## Meet Your Candidates

● **HAROLD CLEAVE** is a veter-  
an politician who has been at  
various times councillor, reeve and  
mayor. A life-long resident, he  
operates a farm near the white  
bridge on the highway, belongs to  
the Masons and Oddfellows, the  
bowling club and in his younger  
days played hockey. In 1935 he was  
warden of the county and was  
mayor from 1944 to 1946.

● **ALEX MACLAREN**, who will  
contest the mayoralty with Mr.  
Cleave is also no stranger on the  
political scene. Moving here from  
Guelph in 1921, he lives with his  
wife and two sons on property ad-  
jacent to the old paper mill. Their  
daughter lives in Toronto and an-  
other son in New York. Mr. Mac-  
laren is director of the Ontario  
Farm Service Force, a prominent  
member of St. John's United Church  
and the Lions Club. In the 20's  
he served two council terms and  
was reeve in 1947-48, his particu-  
lar hobby at county council being  
conservation. He is at present  
chairman of Georgetown Recrea-  
tion Commission.

● **JACK ARMSTRONG**, who  
seeks reelection for a second term  
as reeve was Georgetown's first  
deputy reeve and previously served  
as a councillor. He was county ed-  
ucation chairman last year, and  
also was on the committee which  
promoted a separate House of Re-  
fuge for Halton. Born in town,  
Jack is Mutual Life agent, a Lions  
Club vice-president, past president  
of the Hockey Club and a former  
Lorne Scots bandsman. He sings in  
St. George's Church choir and lives  
on Ontario Street with his wife  
and three sons.

● **W. G. MARSHALL**, known to  
everyone as "Bill" lives on Queen  
St., has a grown family, three of  
whom live in town. For nineteen  
years he was a faithful public ser-  
vant being town constable and  
foreman, tax collector and assessor.  
He is a member of the Presbyter-  
ian Church and president of the  
local Liberal Association. Since  
his resignation as a town employe  
he has worked as a sales clerk in  
Silver's store. He is running for  
reeve.

● **James Goodlet**, a Main Street  
hardware and furniture dealer,  
served as a councillor three years  
and last year became deputy reeve.  
Coming here from Hamilton, he  
first operated what is now Barker  
& Brown's grocery store, then  
bought out Reid's Hardware next  
door. He was chairman of the  
county assessing committee last  
year. He is active in the Retail  
Merchants Association, lives on  
Edith Street with his wife and  
three young sons.

● **KENNETH MACDONALD**, who  
opposes Mr. Goodlet as deputy-  
reeve, has had a three year term  
on county council as reeve from  
1944-46, and was on council before  
that. From a shop behind his  
home on Market Street he oper-  
ates as a skilled repairman for  
knitting machinery. He is a mem-  
ber of the Legion and a past-pres-  
ident of the Lorne Scots Band and  
father of two daughters, one of  
whom lives in Georgetown.

● **MRS. JOE EMMERSON** a candi-  
date for council in Ward One is  
the first lady to ever contest a seat  
on council. She is the mother of  
three children and her husband is  
a Smith & Stone employe. They  
live on the highway near the white  
bridge. She has appeared in sev-  
eral of the Apprentice Productions  
plays and is an enthusiastic Recrea-  
tion Commission worker, being  
a member of the fund-raising com-  
mittee. She attends the United  
Church.

● **ARTHUR HERBERT** a sitting  
member for Ward One in council,  
was chairman of water and fire  
this year. He moved here many  
years ago from Warton, has two  
married children both resident here  
and lives on Main Street near the  
cemetery. Mr. Herbert is a Leg-  
ion member and plays in the  
Lorne Scots Band. He is employed  
with Provincial Paper.

● **VERN McCUMBER**, also a  
council member for Ward One, lives  
with his wife and two children on  
Chapel Street just around the cor-  
ner from the United Church, where  
he is a member and takes an active  
interest in the 50-50 club. He works  
at the Smith & Stone plant. He has  
been council's liaison with the Re-  
creation Commission and was prop-  
erty chairman.

● **GARFIELD MCGILVRAY**, a for-  
mer councillor in 1944-48, is run-  
ning again in Ward One. "Mac" is  
foreman of the Herald Shop, a Uni-  
ted Church member, and secretary  
of Esqueping Agricultural Society.  
With his wife and four children he  
lives on the highway across from  
the United Church.

● **WILLIAM TUCK**, seeking off-  
ice for the first time in Ward One,  
had the tough luck to take ill just  
after his nomination and is at pre-  
sent in Toronto to undergo an op-  
eration for a painful facial neuritis  
condition. An overseas veteran of  
World War Two, he is employed at  
the Provincial Paper Mill, is mar-  
ried and the father of one daugh-  
ter and lives on Main Street North.  
He is a Legion member.

● **CECIL DAVIDSON**, councillor  
for Ward Two for the past three  
years, had the post of police chair-  
man the last two years. He has  
spent most of his life in town, works  
at Dominion Seed House and is a  
member of St. George's Church. He  
belongs to the Lions Club and the  
Curling Club and served overseas  
with the Signal Corps in the  
last war. He and his wife have  
just moved into a new house on  
Albert Street.

● **HARRY HALE**, a former Ward  
Two councillor, again is running  
for office. Father of three married  
children, he lives on Ontario St.,  
works at Provincial Paper where  
he has been a union president.  
Harry is a well known entertainer  
and his comic songs and step danc-  
ing have pleased many a party. He  
is a Legion member.

● **NORMAN HILL**, operator of a  
grocery store on King Street across  
from the station, seeks reelection  
as a Ward Two councillor. He was  
chairman of veterans affairs last  
year. A Lions Club member, Mr.  
Hill is a sports promoter and has  
been secretary of both the hockey  
and baseball clubs in past years.

● **CHARLES LEDWIDGE** lives  
on King Street and operates the  
Georgetown Shock Absorber com-  
pany from the shop beside his re-  
sidence. A married man and daugh-  
ter both live in town. He is a can-  
didate for Ward Two council.

● **THOMAS LYONS**, running for  
reelection in Ward Three has serv-  
ed several terms on council, was  
road chairman two years ago and  
public works chairman last year.  
He farmed in the Cheltenham dis-  
trict before retiring to town about  
fifteen years ago and lives on the  
corner of Church and Edith Street.  
His grown family are all married,  
one son living in town. He attends  
the United Church.

● **ROY MAGLOUGHLEN**, a Ward  
Three council aspirant, retired to  
a house on lower Main Street after  
selling his barber and smoke shop  
business last year to Harold Hutch-  
inson. He came here 25 years ago  
from Tottenham and is pipe major  
of the famous Girls Pipe Band  
which he organized. He is a mem-  
ber of the Presbyterian Church,  
the Orange Lodge, and was one of  
the organizers of the Lorne Scots  
brass band.

● **SID ORR** resigned his seat  
on the Board of Education to  
run as a council candidate in Ward  
Three. He served in that office for  
two years in 1945-46. Operator of  
a book business in Toronto, he  
moved here from the city around  
ten years ago to the Anthony prop-  
erty at the foot of Charles Street.  
He attends St. George's Church.

● **FRANK PETCH**, our local auc-  
tioneer also works at the Domini-  
on Seed House and is a candidate  
in Ward Three. He farmed at Uni-  
on before coming to town ten year  
ago and lives on Edith Street. His  
son, Ross, lives in Montreal. Frank  
attends the United Church, belongs  
to the Curling Club and is a past  
secretary of Esqueping Agricultural  
Society.

● **THOMAS SYKES** is another  
newcomer to the political scene  
and seeks election in Ward Three.  
He lives at the corner of Church  
and Mill Streets, has a grown fam-  
ily, his son Alf living in the house  
just behind. Mr. Sykes sold his  
interest in the Sykes Quarries last  
year where for many years he op-  
erated one of the best-known quar-  
ries in this part of the country. He  
is a member of the Masonic Lodge.

● **RAY WHITMEE**, a member of  
the 1948 council, is running again  
in Ward Three. Returning from  
England where he travelled for  
a shoe company, a few years ago,  
he took over his father's taxi busi-  
ness which he operates from an  
office on Mill Street. With his wife  
and daughter Susan he lives on  
Young Street. He is a vice-presi-  
dent of the Lions Club.

● **ALFRED DEBEAULIEU** is one  
of four candidates for hydro com-  
missioner. He lives on Main Street  
in one of the Cordaro Apartments  
and is an electrician, operating un-  
der the name Beaver Electric. He  
has one son, John, a student at the  
public school.

● **EDWIN BINKLEY**, better  
known as "Bud" came here a few  
years ago as purchasing agent for  
Smith & Stone and lives on River-  
view Crescent. He at one time wor-  
ked in the Toronto Testing Labora-  
tory of the Hydro Electric Power  
Commission, and is a candidate  
for hydro commissioner.

● **BRUCE MACKENZIE**, a Geo-  
rgetown native, is London Life In-  
surance agent here and was with  
the RCAF during the war. He lives  
on Edith Street with his wife and  
son. Bruce has been an active  
worker on the hockey club execu-  
tive and the old Recreational Coun-  
cil and is a member of the Lions  
Club. He was road chairman dur-  
ing a term on council, later served  
on the high school board, and now  
seeks office as hydro commissioner.

● **ERNE RAWSON** came here  
from Guelph three or four years  
ago and opened Ernie's Radio and  
Electric which is located in the  
Roxy Theatre building. He is on  
the executive of the Retail Mer-  
chants Association and lives on Car-  
oline Street with his wife and son.  
He is running for hydro commis-  
sioner.
