
There are now 1,470 telephones in use in Georgetown compared with 850 four years ago. Local calls average 4400 per day against 2730 and long distance calling has reached a daily average of 325, or 150 more than in 1945. In order to meet this unprecedented demand for service the company has continuously improved

and enlarged its facilities. Four positions have been added to the switchboard here since 1947, and large-scale construction of outside. wire and cable has been carried out in order to provide connections with the exchange.

- In spite of this vast improvement which has resulted in the addition of 620 telephones in four years, there are still a few applicants waiting for service here, the manager said. They will receive service as soon as facilities can be provided, he added, and construction of outside wire and cable is expected to continue at a high level in order to keep pace with de
