At this time of year there are many mothers in Halton County facing the prospect of a bleak Christmas for their children. The circumstances vary from home to home. The father may be temporarily out of work; unexpected doctor bills may have used up the savings which were laid aside for Christmas; or it may simply be a matter of the family living from day to day on such a small income that there is nothing left over for Christmas.

But it all adds up to the same thing. Unless assistance comes from outside, the children in these homes will wake up on Christmas morning to find empty stockings.

You can help by sending a donation of money, toys, food, or clothing to the Children's Aid Society in the Bank of Commerce Building, Milton. Perhaps you belong to an organization which would like to make a contribution, as many did last year.

Gifts should reach the Children's Aid office within a week before Christmas so that they may be distributed in plenty of time. Then Santa Claus will come after all to many homes which he might otherwise have overlooked.
