Christmas is a time of words

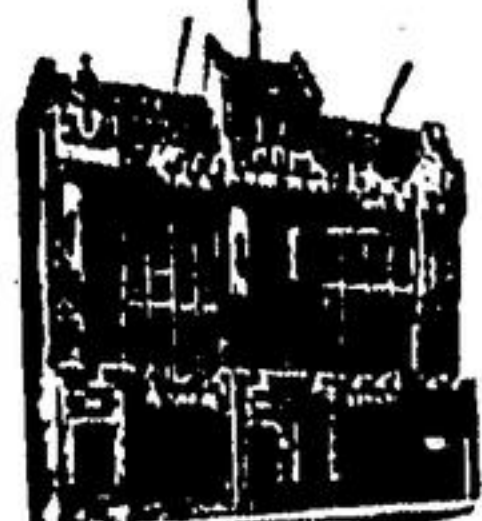
Among other things Christmas is a time of words.
