ST. JOHN'S UNITED CHURCH
Morning worship in St. John's United Church was conducted by the minister Rev. John M. Smith. The lesson was read from 11 Chronicles Chapter 7:12-22, and the text was read from the 14th verse "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and heal their land." Mr. Smith put forth the demand for moral men to handle moral inventions and power as the greatest need of our age. Moral men he said, are produced by moral revival which comes through the redeeming message of Jesus Christ, and moral revivals in the Church are greatly dependent upon the spiritual vitality of the professing Christians. There is a need, he stated, for the modern church, to meditate upon the message of the text - to humble themselves and pray, and seek God's face and turn from their wicked ways. The choir under the leadership of Mr. Norman Laird sang the anthem "When Joseph Went A-Walking." The evening message was entitled "They Shall Be God" and was based on the 6th Beatitude. Mrs. H. Wigglesworth accompanied the congregational singing. It was announced that the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper would be observed on January 8th at the morning and evening services and that on Sunday, January 15th, Mr. Gordon Alcott and his Pax Bible Class from Weston would conduct the evening worship.
