NORM BROWN GETS FIRST LOCAL LICENCE

Norman Brown, a former town councillor, is possessor of the first motor licence issued by the new licence bureau which opened here the first of the year. Mr. Brown has licence 28857, first of the local allocation which runs up to 29000. Strictly speaking, it is not the first licence issued in Georgetown for several years ago it was the custom for an office to be opened one day each year by the Ontario Motor League for sale of licences. Of late years local drivers had to get their licences in Brampton, Acton or Milton and the new office here will be a convenience to town and district people. In its first week of operation from an office on Mill Street, the issues, M. H. Moyer reports a gross of about \$1500. One hundred passenger and 25 commercial plates have been issued, as well as 155 chauffeur's licences and 115 for operators. Mr. Moyer hopes that people will get their permits and licences early in order that he can serve the public with a minimum of delay. The new office will be a boon to merchants, providing a service which was not formerly available.

5th Line Forum Meets With Farmers' Club

The Fifth Line (Chinguacousy) Farm Forum held their first 1950 meeting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Lynds in conjunction with Terra Cotta Farmers' Club and 35 people were present. The law of supply and demand was the topic and the group opinion was that it was not wise for a farmer to change his line of production as prices change because of the loss in scrapping equipment and because it is best for him to produce the product he best understands. Over-production, unsteady supply and natural elements are factors that interfere with the law of supply and demand. It was felt that farmers should follow their produce further on the market. There should be better advertising which would keep farm produce before the public and our own population could help to consume surpluses. The program arranged by Mrs. Wilbert Cleave and Mrs. Lloyd Crichton included piano and vocal solos by Marilyn Cleave and Beverley Hyatt and several amusing games and contests conducted by Mrs. Crichton. Mrs. C. Anderson moved a vote of thanks, especially to Jack Pawley and Charlie Barrett of Caledon who helped with the discussion period. A social was spent at the close of the meeting.
