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Dills Heads District High School Board

Excessive Share Too High Says Col. Brown
Will Consider Problem

Arlott Dills, publisher of the Acton Free Press and the Canadian Champion, Milton, was elected chairman of North Halton High School District Board at the first meeting of the board last Thursday in Milton Town Hall. Mr. Dills succeeds Arthur Beaumont of Gless Williams, last year's chairman.

The district has been in existence for two years, administering schools in Acton and Milton and with Georgetown's entry into the district this year, will now assume control of the local school system. The district comprises the three towns as well as two townships. Exquesing and Nassagaweya. Members of the eleven-man board are: John Bell, Walter Blehn, Dr. J. B. Milne from Georgetown; Arthur Beaumont, William Schenk from Exquesing; W. J. Coon, Acton; F. W. Fitzgerald, Milton; Ross Carbert, Nassagaweya and three county appointees, Lt.-Col. Gordon Brown of Exquesing, N.L. Pickett of Milton and Mr. Dills of Acton.

Meeting nights were set as the fourth Monday each month and it is planned to alternate meetings from town to town. The next meeting on January 23rd will be held in Georgetown High School. Appointments of attendance officers for the three schools were M. H. Moyer, Georgetown; C. Mason, Acton and Police Chief Hugh Washington, Milton. They will receive a yearly fee of \$50 each.

Committees, the first named being chairman, were appointed as follows:

Finance — Fitzgerald, Milne, Beaumont.

Management — Pickett, Blehn, Coon.

Transportation — Brown, Bell, Fitzgerald.

Building — Coon, Schenk, Carter.

Col. Brown declared that Exquesing was unhappy with the present share of sharing education costs on a assessment basis and thought that the township was paying out as all proportion to the services it was receiving. Last year Exquesing paid 30 per cent of high school taxes and this year, with George Town and the district, her share will be 45 per cent. He estimated he said that the Exquesing representatives on county council were taking steps to remedy this and was asking the Department of Education for advice as to procedure on the basis of changed circumstances. "said Col. Brown. He felt that some redress should be made if Exquesing would be forced to withdraw from the district. The

secretary, Adam Stoyan of Milton, was asked to prepare figures for the next meeting showing the percentage of costs on the assessment basis this year and the percentage of school differences from the various municipalities in order that further discussions could take place on the matter.

A film strip projector was purchased for the Acton school and an allowance of \$1500 made for the purchase of books for the Georgetown school library. The board is also considering installing a program clock in Milton school at an estimated \$2000 cost.

Happy birthday to Kenneth Grant, who will be four years old on Saturday, the 21st.


We all wish Mrs. Johnson of Georgetown a happy birthday this coming Wednesday the 18th.
