The Annual Vestry meeting of St. Paul's Church, Norval, was held on Monday at the Rectory. Rev. J. E. Maxwell opened the meeting with prayer, following which the minutes of the previous meeting were read by Mrs. A. Burton in the absence of Miss Ivy Rawlingson, Vestry Clerk. In the Rector's report which followed, Mr. Maxwell outlined the aims and accomplishments of the Church during the year, and thanked the officers and other members of the congregation who had helped in the work of the church. Miss Prairie Maguire gave the financial report which showed that with special efforts during the year over \$2000 had been received in the funds, but of this a considerable portion was used in completing the stucco job on the Church. It was also noted that the Sunday School was in a thriving condition and that the Guild under Mr. M. Rushmer, President, had done excellent service at the church functions.

Mr. W. Coupland gave the Parish Hall report which also showed a balance on the credit side but it was the opinion of the Vestry that because of a policy of generosity toward community enterprises the Hall balance did not convey a fair estimate of the extent to which the Hall had been used and the cash on hand was far from sufficient to carry out much needed repairs and replacements.

Mr. W. Coupland was appointed Rector's Warden and Mr. John Lawlingson was elected to continue as People's Warden with Miss Prairie Maguire acting as Treasurer. The Hall Committee will remain the same with the addition of Dr. Forbes. Dr. Forbes has also very kindly been assisting with the carrying out of the duties of the committee. Messrs. W. Finlayson, M. Rushmer, H. Moreton, Dennis Brown, W. Coupland.

The Vestry closed with the Benediction by the Rector, after which lunch was served and a social hour enjoyed.

At the January meeting of the Orange Junior Farmers held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robt. Marshall last Wednesday, Rev. J. Maxwell was the guest speaker for the joint meeting. His topic was "Neighborhoods" — an old-fashioned virtue which somehow or other in this fast-moving age seems to be a second-hand consideration. 
