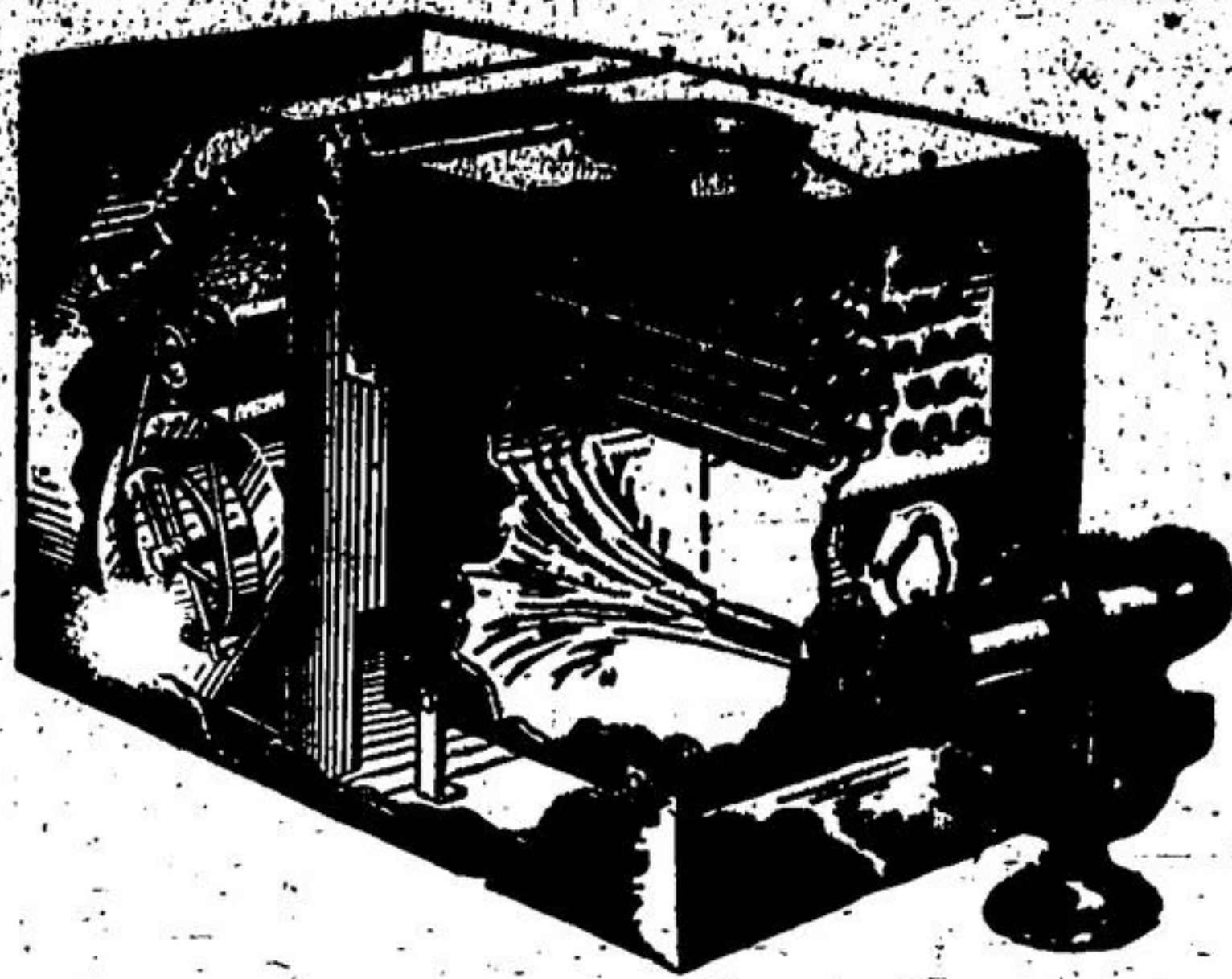

The month of January was away above normal in average temperature. The month's maximum of 36 was 10 degrees above normal, while the minimum of 20 was 8 degrees above normal. The snowfall of 12 inches for the month was only 2 inches below normal; but the rainfall of 3.15 was 3 times the normal.
