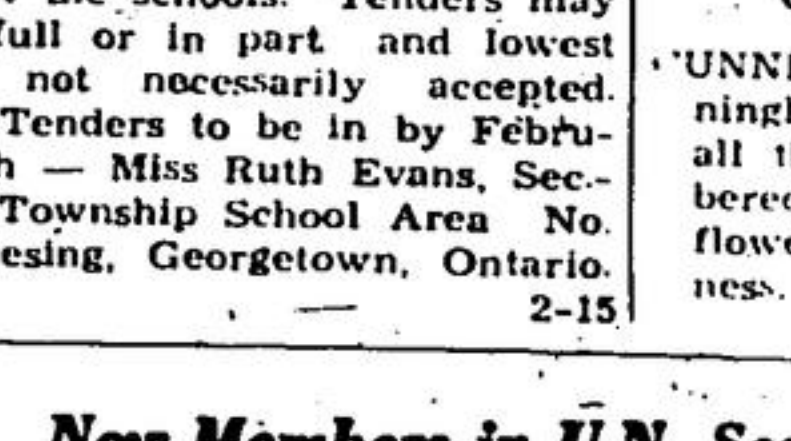

## F. L. McGilvray Dies Suddenly At Home

Death came suddenly on Satur-  
day afternoon, February 4th, to a  
well-known Georgetown man, Fran-  
cis Lorne McGilvray, who succumbed  
to a heart attack at his home  
on Guelph Street.

Mr. McGilvray was a son of the  
late Peter McGilvray and Jane  
Parsons and was of Scottish stock,  
his father coming from Jaly, Ar-  
gyleshire, Scotland. He was born in  
1873 in Albion Township, Peel  
County, and was the youngest in a  
family of nine. He learned the  
sheet metal and tinmith trade  
in Toronto, where in 1907 he mar-  
ried the former Ida Hills of Stuy-  
vesant. They lived in Arthur for a  
time and moved to Georgetown in  
1912. He worked for over 25 years  
for the late W. G. Anthony and later  
for R. H. Thompson and for  
many years operated his own sheet  
metal business. He was a member  
of the United Church.

He is survived by his wife and  
two sons, Garfield of Georgetown,  
and Walter of Dunnville and four  
grandchildren, Ross, Gail, Douglas  
and Carol. A sister, Mrs. W. J.  
Brown lives in Caledon and a brother,  
Watson McGilvray in Toron-  
to.

Rev. John M. Smith conducted  
the funeral service on Tuesday at  
the McClure Funeral Home and  
interment was made in Greenwood  
Cemetery. Pallbearers were John
