

BIG ICE SHOW PLANNED BY GEORGETOWN GIRLS PIPE BAND

Cast of Fifty in Rose Garden Follies — Orchestra Will Provide Music This Year

Everyone will remember the skating carnival which the Girls Pipe Band sponsored in the arena last year. It was one of the most successful events ever held in town and the girls raised a substantial sum of money which went towards the purchase of the bus which has since been used to carry them to engagements in various parts of the country. People have been looking forward to another one this spring and Pipe Major Roy Magloughlin and the girls in the band have been busily preparing for some time for the evening of February 24th when the second annual show will be held.

The Rose Garden Ice Follies describes the decorative scheme and thousands of hand made artificial roses will be used to transform the arena into such a garden. Words can scarcely describe the elaborate master plan drawn up by Mr. Magloughlin as a stage setting. It includes a picket fence effect all around the ice surface and evergreen and climbing roses trimming the stage entrance from the dressing rooms at the far end of the rink. Across the goal mouth at the rink entrance will be a hedge and flower beds and the piece de resistance will be a gold-trimmed panel across the penalty box which will spell out the Pipe Band in roses.

An orchestra from Toronto will provide music for the ice show in place of the recording machine used last year and the orchestra will be installed on a special platform at the front entrance. Riley Brethour, whose extemporaneous humour helped to put the show across last year is coming out from Toronto to again handle the job of master of ceremonies. The pipe band, in uniform, is also scheduled to put in an appearance on the ice. This year's cast numbers 50 performers and is even more outstand-

ing than the artists who appeared last year. Norman Faulkner, Canada's only one-legged professional will again amaze the crowd with his clever skating and Toby Keel, a ten-year-old veteran of over sixty carnivals will be again among the stars. Solo performers also include Betty Hiscock and Joyce Comrie-Palmer, who placed well in the recent Dominion championships at St. Catharines. Charles Snelling and Michael Pfenner, The Montgomerys, a brother and sister act, will be the adagio team and the Four Bumps will provide plenty of comedy. The cast includes members of the Granite Club, the Toronto Skating Club and the University Skating Club.

All seats in the arena are being reserved at prices of 75c and \$1.00 and are on sale at Lucky Strike Bowling Club, Hutch's Smoke Shop, McClure's Home Furnishings, Robb's Drug Store and from members of the band.

Hello Homemakers! We have the "grumps" today, and the reason could be that we missed breakfast. In many households the morning meal is a hit-and-run affair — or equally unhappy it is deadly monotonous. A different kind of fruit vice is often less expensive and very pleasant, or fruit served on the cereal saves time and is interesting.

Toast is always good, but who doesn't get tired of the same kind of toast seven mornings every week? There are ever so many different kinds of breads and, of course, we could get up a little earlier occasionally and surprise the family with fresh muffins or griddle cakes.

Come Shrove Tuesday you will be expected to serve pancakes or waffles at one meal during the day. Why not begin a better Breakfast Campaign next week — serve pancakes for breakfast one day, a whole grain cereal another day and scrambled eggs the following morning. Keep a package of prepared mix on hand, a few different cereals and a few dried fruits — apricots, prunes and figs — to be served alternately with citrus fruit juices.

TOMATO JUICE PANCAKES
2 cups sifted pastry flour
1 tsp. baking-soda
1/2 tsp. salt
Few grains ground mace
1 tsp. granulated sugar
1 beaten egg
1 tsp. minced onion
2 cup tomato juice
3 tbsps. melted fat

Measure dry ingredients into a bowl; make a well in the centre and gradually stir in liquids. Mix to a smooth batter. Heat heavy frying pan and add a little fat, enough to run over the surface. (Some griddles do not need to be greased).

Drop batter by spoonfuls and cook until tiny bubbles appear and break surface. Turn and brown on other side. Serve hot with bacon or sausages.

WHEAT GERM WAFFLES
1 cup sifted pastry flour
3 tbsps. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
3 tbsps. sugar
1 cup wheat germ
2 beaten egg whites
2 beaten egg yolks
1 1/4 cups milk
1 tsp. grated lemon rind
1/2 tsp. vanilla
5 tbsps. melted shortening

Measure dry ingredients into a bowl and gradually stir in liquids. Fold in egg whites until thoroughly combined. Drop spoonfuls of batter on the waffle iron. Cook until steam stops flowing from sides of iron.

CHEESE MUFFINS
2 cups flour
3 tbsps. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
2 tbsps. melted butter
1 egg, well beaten
1 cup milk
1/2 cup grated cheese

Mix and sift flour, salt and baking powder. Add cheese. Combine milk and egg and add dry mixture. Then add cooled, melted butter. Bake in buttered muffin tins in a moderate hot oven at 400 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes. Makes 9 to 12 muffins.

TAKE A TIP
1. Make a thin pancake batter by adding a little more liquid, cook pancakes and wrap around sausage.
2. Waffle batter tends to thicken upon standing, so you may add milk, if necessary, to make a "pour" batter.
3. If desired, 1 egg may be used instead of 2 in these recipes. In that case, increase baking powder to 4 teaspoons and add a little more milk.

4. Cooking oil — a vegetable oil — may be substituted for melted shortening in quick cooking batters.
5. Serve waffles with maple syrup, mock rum syrup, diced fruit, spice sauce, ice cream sauce, or ice cream.
6. Serve pancakes with sausages, bacon, fried mushrooms or scrambled egg.
7. Plain muffins, too, well with marmalade, jelly, jam, peanut butter or honey.
