A funeral service, conducted by Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson was held last Wednesday at the McClure Funeral Home for Mrs. Charles Hoare, who died in Peel Memorial Hospital, Brampton, on Sunday, February 5th. Mrs. Hoare succumbed to a stroke which she suffered a few weeks earlier.

The former Ida May Kelly, who was a daughter of Annie Louise Victoria Campbell and the late George Wealy Kelly and was born at Campbell's Cross in 1891. The family later moved to Norval where she lived until she married Charles Hoare, coming to Georgetown to make her home.

Johanson, (Isobel) of Detroit, Michigan, Reg of Acton, John of Barrie, and George, Mrs. Frank Toat (Evelyn), Charles, Margaret, Robert and William of town. Her mother, Mrs. G. W.
