He was, as most of you probably read in last week's Herald, a protege of former Metropolitan Opera manager, Edward Johnson. Mr. Rockwood studied under his supervision in New York for several years, and afterwards sang in opera there. He was with the U.S.O. at the end of the war, when he visited and entertained in Japan, the Philippines and China. Noting that he sang many favourite songs at his recital here, Margaret mentioned that for over two years, he sang the leading role in that well-beloved operetta, "The Student Prince".

Former Metropolitan Manager Johnson is still very much interested in John Rockwood's voice, which he considers outstanding. The Christmas before last, Mr. Johnson asked Mr. Rockwood down to New York for a couple of weeks, to help him entertain at the height of the Met's social season. And through Mr. Johnson, John Rockwood has become a close friend of Federal Conservative leader George Drew and his wife — Mrs. Drew being the former Florenza Johnson. Last year, Mr. Rockwood was with the Toronto Conservatory of Music, and took an active part in producing the operetta "Rosalinda", which you may recall was staged and sung so successfully by the Conservatory last winter at the Royal Alexandra Theatre.

Certainly, it was a privilege to hear such a fine voice, and we hope the rumours that he may return again for another recital, before too long, are true.

### WITH THE FORUMS

Thirteen Halton farm forums forwarded reports to the central office on the February 6th broadcast on the subject "Are Canadians Well Fed?" The broadcast was a dramatized dream and was received with varying opinions. Four thought it was good, three fair, one poor and the remainder gave no opinion.

North Stratford wondered if modern nutrition was as good as in pioneer times, when wheat was ground with stones and bran, and shorts were not eliminated.

We produce more milk today than ever before but the average person consumes less. In certain parts of China, the people pay their doctors white they are well and when they are ill the fees are discontinued.

Some forums reported that most members do follow health rules. Keizo and Mt. Nemo felt that adults as well as children need to eat more vegetables and drink more milk.

Suggestions for better balanced meals included milk puddings, cream, soups, leafy vegetables, liver, fish, fresh vegetables and fruits, with less pie and pastries.

All agreed that vegetables need to be cooked quickly in a minimum amount of water and served promptly.

Any water drained off should be used for soups and gravies.

Hornby suggests cod liver oil the year round for growing children and an enquiry about why vegetables are dumped when people don't get enough of them.

Proper storage of fruits and vegetables was discussed, a number of forums suggesting cold pack, quick freeze and storage in pits or cool cellars.

S. S. 4, Esquissip, gave directions for building a cold storage locker.

Postville ladies are very interested in a booklet, Healthy Eating, and requested one be ordered for each family.
