Georgetown Wins Three Dixie Throws in Sponge

Raiders Stand By For Playdown Mates — Ferri, Martin, Scoring Stars of Playoffs.

Travelling to Dixie minus two players and Leigh Bradbury, Raiders won the second playoff game last Wednesday by a score of 3-1. Rene Martin was the big star for the winners, collecting five goals. Nick Ferri set up the first goal, and assisted in the other two.

Dixie put up a good fight all through the first period, when neither team scored. In the second period, the Raiders broke loose and notched three goals. The first by Martin from Patterson followed ten seconds later by Chappel from Ferri. The puck was no sooner stopped than Martin tallied his second goal of the evening, and Max Bradbury came through five minutes later as Mel Beaumont shot him a pass. Cox tallied for Dixie and the period.
