



BOY SCOUTS HOLD FOUNDER'S DAY SERVICE

On Sunday afternoon the Boy Scouts, Wolf Cubs, Committee members and Ladies Auxiliary members attended St. John's United Church where a service was held to the honour and memory of Lord Baden-Powell, founder of the Boy Scout movement which now is world wide and numbers over five and one-half million members. The colour were carried by P.L. Tom Buck, P.L. Bob Simpson and Sister Lois Mackie. The service of worship was conducted by Scoutmaster Rev. J. M. Smith, assisted by Assistant Scout Master Bob Smith and Cubmaster Rev. Broomehead. Mr. Alfred Tost sang the Scout hymn as a solo, and Mr. K. Harrison accompanied the congregational singing. The scripture lesson from Luke 10:25-37 was read by the A.S.M. and the 23rd psalm in unison was led by the C.M. The story of the Unknown Scout who was largely responsible for the coming of Scouting to America was told by C.M. Reg Broomehead. Rev. J. M. Smith commented on the life and vision of Lord Baden-Powell and challenged all connected with the movement to live by the high ideals of the founder.
