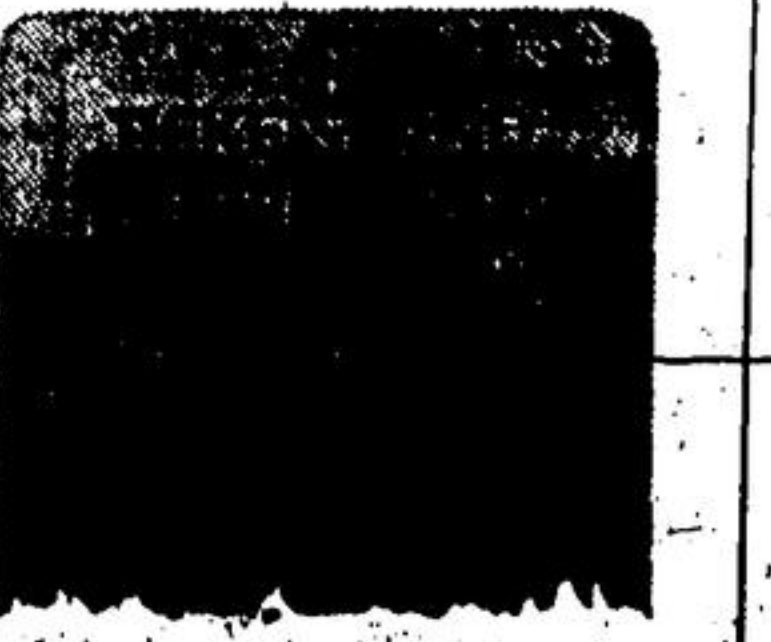

The colour were carried by P.L. Tom Buck, P.L. Bob Simpson and Scoutmaster Rev. J. M. Smith. The service of worship was conducted by Scoutmaster Rev. J. M. Smith, assisted by Assistant Scoutmaster Bob Smith and Cubmaster Rev. Broomehead. Mr. Alfred Tost sang the Scout hymn as a solo, and Mr. K. Harrison accompanied the congregational singing. The scripture lesson from Luke 10:25-37 was read by the A.S.M. and the 23rd psalm in unison was led by the C.M.
