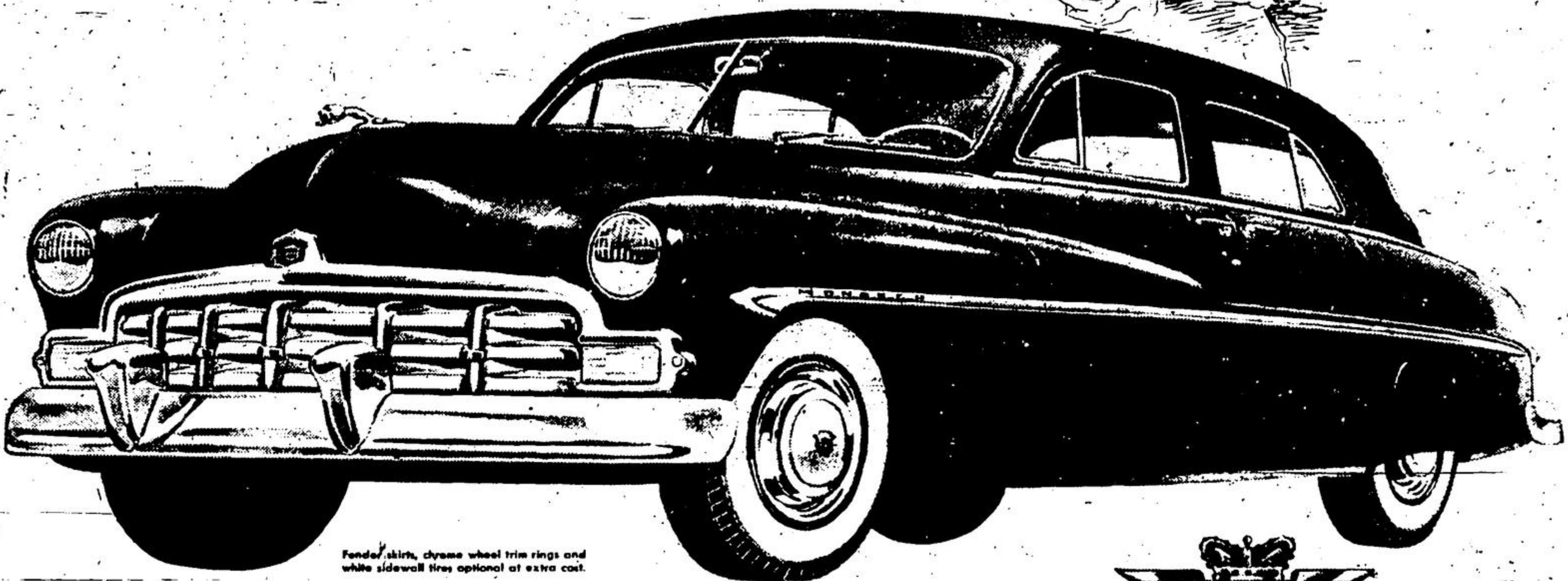


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HORNBY

NORVAL

The World Day of Prayer was observed in Norval United Church last Friday with Mrs. Guy Wilson taking the Service. Rev. Alex Cowan gave the address in which he outlined the growth of the various missionary orders throughout the world, tracing the history of Christianity previous to the time of St. Francis of Assisi, through the days of the Reformation and up to the present when now only Afghanistan and Tibet have refused to prosper their welfare by acknowledging the one true God. Mr. Cowan noted in his address that all through history when the Church was hard-pressed at its centre, these difficulties have been the means of promoting the spread of Christianity into many other remote corners of the world and the new missions acted in their turn as the centres of still wider spheres.
