As there wasn't a regular meeting last Tuesday—thought it might be interesting to take a peek at a few other CGIT groups across Canada.

In the Peace River district in Alberta, one field, whose only minister is a student supply in summer, would have been without any service this winter had it not been for the CGIT Vesper Service.

At Waterloo, Quebec, the CGIT, held a Mother-and-Daughter banquet in the new school building. The girls cooked the dinner themselves in the home economics room. CGIT have made such an impression on Waterloo that they have been given \$100 a year by the Kiwanis to help finance their own summer camp at Ayers' Cliff.

CGIT girls at Vancouver Heights Baptist Church, B.C., and the Boy Scouts of the same church, meet together once a month at a Teen Time programme which includes crafts, games, refreshments, and a song service.

Did you know that Toronto has a Leader-Grad graduation each year, complete with gowns, diplomas and flowers? Leader-Grad is a two year training course for graduates of the CGIT. The course is varied and covers such subjects as Bible Study, Psychology, Recreation, Art of Leadership, etc. Girls attend one night a week over a

two-year period. At the end of this time those who have fulfilled the requirements — regular attendance, written assignments, student participation, etc., are presented with diplomas at an impressive graduation ceremony.
