WHAT COUNCIL DID

the new system of water billing, the foreman reported.

Informed the Recreation Commission this no charge should be made to the Girls Pipe Band for their two weekly practices at the Old Town Hall.

Pipe Major Roy Magloughlin appeared before council to request this, explaining that he had been told the GRC had set a charge of \$10 for outside organizations, \$5 for local and \$2.50 for the band. He thought it unfair, as it was a public building, and the band had never made a charge to the town for a public function, other than the memorial service for which the Legion had paid the brass band for the past 20 years.

He suggested consideration might be given to a new building at the park, the town and fair board co-operating.

Petch—The brass band uses the town hall free and, I think the pipe band should have the same.

Cleave—We give the building free of charge to the GRC and I don't see why they should want to charge.

Hale—It's a public building and they can't charge for it.

Cleave—Maybe we erred. A band which gives such service shouldn't pay.

Hale—When I was union president we gave a donation to the hall, but no charge was made.

Lyons—Why not fix up some of the buildings we have. The library ceiling could be lowered and it would be easier to heat.

MacDonald—Didn't the band used to have the arena?

Magloughlin—The last council told us they would pay any charges, but we later had to leave because a charge was going to be made. The Rose Room is away ahead of the Town Hall for accommodation. It's purely up to Council to decide.

Cleave—I'm one who thinks they shouldn't pay.

MacDonald—Me, too.

Petch—They should have one room or the other.

McGilvray—I was talking to Mr. Maclaren, the GRC chairman and he said parents were dissatisfied with the heating. The charges are devised to pay for caretaking.

Appointed Alf Collins 1950 weed inspector at a salary of \$50. (Moved by Marshall and MacDonald.)

Will advertise for a caretaker of the Municipal Building at a \$50 monthly salary to replace Charles Chapman, who is leaving for England in April.

Gave permission to the Retail Merchants Associations to place waste disposal containers on the streets.

Advised Joseph Armstrong that the town men could not handle by themselves cutting down a tree in front of his Guelph Street property. The hydro will be contacted to help in the removal.

Sent a list of charitable donations formerly made by the town to county council, which is considering making composite grants for all.

Reeve Marshall reported that all town water is now coming from the new well.

Received the opinion of Town Solicitor K. M. Langdon that the municipality has a right to require Art Scott, owner of Georgetown Transportation Co., to obtain a licence for picking up passengers and freight in town, and designate on what streets his bus can operate.

Mr. Scott was at the meeting and asked that any decision on the matter be left till a future meeting.

Mayor Harold Cleave explained that the solicitor advised the town not to forbid Mr. Scott to operate to Normandy Blvd. until he obtained a \$150 licence (this motion was passed at the last council meeting), until the legality of the council's action could be checked. Mr. Scott said he had intended coming to council about a franchise but wanted all his facts first. Council will discuss the whole matter with him at a future date.

Numerous residents of Normandy Blvd. attended this meeting and several expressed their desire that the bus service be continued. One man wanted to know why taxi fares here were higher than Milton and Acton. Cr. Lyons said that in Welland, with 30,000 population, a 25c fee was charged. Council seemed to favour allowing a bus service, Mayor Cleave saying perhaps action had been hasty without hearing both sides of the question.

Mayor Cleave said that when so many Normandy Blvd. residents were at the meeting, he would clarify the question of sale of wartime houses. As he understood it, the town would forego \$ to 10 thousand dollars if they were sold before 1951. When they are offered

for sale, the town has the first option to buy all the houses in a block, but as long as he is mayor he had no intention of getting into the real estate business. The tenant has the next option to buy, then any war veteran. Questioned on whether a house could be sold over the tenants head, he said he didn't know as it wasn't mentioned in the agreement. Cr. Hale said he understood a tenant could not be put out as long as he paid his rent. Cr. Petch said there might have been some misunderstanding when the matter was previously discussed that the council favoured selling the houses when all council was after was information.
