**Everett Cole Retires
 New Customs Man Here**

Collector of customs and excise here for 37 years, Everett Cole has retired on pension. Mr. Cole's successor is W. E. (Bill) Matthews.
 Mr. Cole has been an efficient and popular public servant and his services will be missed by those with whom he dealt. He is proud of the fact that he never in his 37 years has there been one complaint to head office about his dealings with the public here. He retires with the good wishes of his friends and the knowledge that they will miss him. As a token of regard, members of the post office staff presented him with a Sheaffer pen prior to his retirement last month.
 Mr. Cole left a position with the Bank of Hamilton to take the position and during the early years had his office in part of the freight shed at the CNR station. Later the office was moved to the Elmer C. Thompson Insurance office and in 1933, after the building of the new post office on Mill Street was located in its present quarters upstairs in that building. It serves a wide area stretching to Allendale in the north and Milton. The business handled has increased tremendously with the expansion of Smith & Stone, Ltd. and the erection of the Alliance Paper Mill which was built after Mr. Cole took office. There is considerable customs business also with the P. L. Robertson Mfg. Co. in Milton. A few years ago, Mr. Andy Crichton was hired as office assistant and he will continue under the new collector.
 The Bank of Hamilton, at the time Mr. Cole worked there, was located in the present office of the Bell Telephone Co. next to the Herald Office. The bank was later taken over by the Bank of Commerce and moved to its present location at the four corners. The first bank in town, he recalls being told, was where Dr. C. V. Williams now has his office.
 The new collector, Mr. Matthews, is a native of Toronto and has been with the department for 26 years. He is married and for the present his wife is remaining in Toronto until they secure suitable

accommodation here. He is boarding at the home of Mrs. A. M. Ballantine.

Mr. Waite was president of Mining Corporation of Canada and a director of Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines, Hudson Bay Mining and Smelting Co., Waite Amulet Mines and Kerr-Addison Gold Mines.
 Mr. Waite moved to Toronto shortly before his death, and gave his beautiful 17-room home at Brampton, Rowanbank, to the Peel Memorial Hospital to be used for any purpose which would assist in the work of the institution. The house has been sold by the hospital board to C. V. Charters, president of the Charters Publishing Company.
