ED CAPPS SPEAKER AT LIONS "MUSIC NIGHT"

Well known in Georgetown as music teacher at the high school and as conductor of the Choral Society, when it was in existence, Mr. Ed Capps of Mt. TOWNSHIP GRAVEL CONTRACT AWARDED
