Raiders on March to "B" Finals

Beat Wainfleet Twice Here Again Tonight

Georgetown Raiders are still having easy sailing in their quest of the Intermediate B OHA hockey championship. With Dixie, Caledonia and Woodbridge falling by the wayside, they are two games up on Wainfleet, and the third game of this series will be played here tonight.

Only seven teams remain in the running. Sundridge and Walkerton have their series tied 2-all. Lakefield has a one game edge over Marmora. Stayner has defaulted to Milverton. Should Raiders win tonight they will meet the Lakefield-Marmora winner in the semi-finals.

School Board Ratifies New Cost Sharing Plan

Ratification of a new cost sharing scheme was made by North Halton District high school board at their meeting Monday in Milton. Esqueping gets a substantial decrease in school costs under the new plan, with the three urban municipalities each contributing about \$1400 more.

The 1950 budget totals \$148,000, the district's share being \$35,000. Improvements planned for Georgetown school include a \$1000 expenditure on washrooms, \$500 for installing gas in the laboratory and \$350 for painting and lighting, furthering the program of improvements inaugurated by last year's Board of Education.

A \$400 time clock was purchased for Milton High School and the salary of the secretary-treasurer, Adam Sproat increased from \$500 to \$750. A request from the teachers for establishment of a salary schedule was turned over to the management committee for consideration.

After Easter transportation to Georgetown school will be provided for students from Terra Cotta and Glen Williams, who up to now have not had this privilege.

Norval and Smith and Stone Tie In First Playoff

A real thriller was the first playoff game in GRC industrial hockey Monday when Smith and Stone and Norval battled to a 6-all tie in overtime. There was never a dull moment from the time Jack King scored the opener for S&S until Clark Lyons tied up the game on a pass from Rev. J. L. Self in overtime.

In between times, King scored another, Wilson 3 and Louth 1 for the local team, Golden getting two assists and Barber and Chuplin each one. Clark Lyons continued his sharpshooting for Norval with 3 other goals and 2 assists. Dixon had 2, Laidlaw one and McMurchy and Self assists.

Two games remain before a champion is declared, and the teams meet again next Monday.

Miss Elizabeth Louisa Caldwell, a former resident of town, died in Brampton on Friday, March 24th. She was born on August 28, 1865, on a farm at Lot 33, 4th Line West, Chinguacousy, where she lived, until 1911, moving to Terra Cotta. In 1914 she moved to Georgetown to live with her twin sister, Mrs. David Fraser, who died in October, 1947. They lived in the house on Market Street now owned by Miss I. Preston.

Miss Caldwell was an active member of Knox Presbyterian Church. She is survived by one brother, Hugh, on the old homestead in Cheltenham.

Rev. Alex J. Calder conducted the funeral service on Monday at the McClure Funeral Home and interment was made in Boston Mills Cemetery. Friends and relatives attended the funeral from Cheltenham, Brampton, Orillia, Acton and Niagara Falls.

GRC Asks More Grant Town Finance Committee Turns Deaf Ear

At the request of Georgetown Recreation Commission, a special meeting was held on Monday between officials of that organization and the finance committee of council. The GRC, which received a \$400 grant from the town last year, had asked for \$1700 this year, but when the tax rate was struck last week, the grant was kept at \$400.

Mr. Garvie, government financier, accompanied Alex MacLaren, GRC chairman. They pointed out that last year the GRC had spent \$5,000 in its program and this year had laid out an even more ambitious program which would entail the expenditure of \$7500.

Mayor Cleave said that GRC had done a fine job, but that he did not think the ratepayers would sanction any higher grant at the present time when the mill rate was the highest in history. Finance chairman Garfield McGillivray said he thought the decisive vote in December indicated that taxpayers were economy minded and he could not sanction an increase.

The matter will come up for final discussion at next Monday's meeting.

Anglican Bishop Here For Sunday Confirmation

Right Reverend Walter E. Bagnall, Anglican Bishop of Niagara, paid his first official visit to Georgetown and Glen Williams on Sunday, when he officiated at confirmation services in the two churches. At St. George's in the morning the church was filled to the doors as parishioners greeted their new bishop. A large confirmation class of adults, as well as a number of young people were admitted to full church membership during the service.

Bishop Bagnall's sermon was thought-provoking. He compared St. Luke with Dimos. The two men were mentioned three times in St. Paul's letters, Dimos, who in modern times might be called a "go-getter," was placed first when St. Paul said "Dimas and Luke are with me." The second mention was "Luke is with me, and Dimos," and finally "Only Luke is with me. Dimas has forsaken me."

He asked those present to emulate St. Luke, whose faithful service and unswerving loyalty make him a noted figure in history. There are many like Dimos who are enthusiasts and who forsake their friends and ideas for new ones.

Blind Since Birth, Thomas Ellenton Dies

A well-known former resident of Georgetown, Thomas Ellenton died in Brampton on Tuesday, March 21. He was the last surviving member of the family of the late George and Agnes Ellenton and was born in Erin Township in 1883. He was predeceased by a sister, Agnes, and two brothers, James who died in August, 1947 and George who died in 1949.

Mr. Ellenton, who had been blind since birth, lived in Georgetown for many years. He was a familiar figure on Main Street and in spite of his handicap he got around remarkably well and did the family shopping. He occupied himself with basket weaving and made beautiful products of intricate design and clever craftsmanship.

Eight years ago he left town to make his home in Summerville with his niece, Mrs. J. H. Levett. He was a member of the Church of England.

William Miller Dies At Sunnybrook Hospital

A resident of Georgetown for over thirty years, William Miller died on Sunday, March 19 in Sunnybrook Hospital. He was 68 years of age.

Mr. Miller was a native of Scotland and was born at Arnlave, Kincardine, Perthshire. He first came to Canada in 1914 and the next year returned to the Old Country where he enlisted with the Canadian Army in an artillery regiment. He served throughout the war and later with the occupation army in Germany.

In 1919 he returned to Canada with his wife and came to Georgetown where he secured employment at the Alliance Paper Mill, later working at the Provincial mill. For several years he was superintendent of the golf course.

Mr. Miller is survived by his wife, the former Annie Fisher, and one brother David in Thornhill, Scotland. He was predeceased two weeks before his death by his sister.
