BUDGET ESTIMATES SHOW REVENUE, EXPENSE FOR 1950

Georgetown taxpayers will contribute \$104,527 to the town treasury in 1950. With a local assessment of \$1,537,510, the tax rate has been set at 6.6 mills this year. It is possibly the highest tax rate which Georgetown will ever have, for when the new assessing system comes into effect next year, the assessment will increase considerably and the mill rate will of course decrease.

This year's tax rate is 4 mills higher than last year, due mainly to a \$3,000 increase in county rate and an increased expenditure for the public school of \$1,000. No new major expenditures have been allowed by council. Largest single item in the budget is for schools, a total of \$27,000. County expenditures take almost \$13,000 and salaries of town officials are close to \$15,000. A detailed budget estimate appears below.

The council plans fewer meetings and has budgeted \$1300 in place of \$1800 paid to members last year. The estimate for grants (\$300 last year) has also dropped because of a decision by county council to take over payment of these.
