What Council Did

ON MONDAY, APRIL 3rd

Will grant a franchise to Art Scott for operation of a bus service in town, subject to the approval of council, the town collector and Mr. Scott.
(Moved by Petch and Hill.)
Mr. Scott presented an agreement in use in Newmarket between that town and a bus line and suggested a similar type of contract here which would protect both parties. At present he is operating a bus in town. He said, Newmarket charges a \$25 yearly fee for two buses. Barrie pays a company to operate and in another town no charge was made.
A delegation of over a dozen citizens attended the meeting to voice their approval of bus service. Mayor Cleave said he could see no reason why a licence shouldn't be granted and several other members voiced the same opinion.

James Goodlet, president of the Retail Merchants Association, presented a revised parking plan on behalf of that organization. It suggested angle parking on three sides of Main Street with parallel parking from Cordova to the McGibbon corner; also the creation of a one-way street from Main Street to Mill and circling down Wesleyan, with angle parking on Mill.
Mr. Goodlet said that as a former councillor he fully realized the problems of parking and the merchants, after consideration, felt the plan should be tried.
McGillivray — The new system hasn't been given a fair trial yet.
(At present a plan is being tried of parallel parking all along Main Street.)

Petch — There have been complaints. Two Saturday nights I've gone home to get away from them.
Cleave — I've heard a lot of favourable comments about the new system. I think this has cleared up Main Street and would like to see it given more of a trial. A few are against it, but that can be expected. What does Constable Sheffield think of it?
Sheffield — As far as the police are concerned, the present system is the most satisfactory. Simple rules are the easiest to enforce and this plan looks complicated. There might be some merit in angle parking on Mill.

Goodlet — I can understand that it is fine for the police, because there are no restrictions.
Marshall — It is only a trial and if satisfactory it is council's plan to continue parallel parking and enforce the two-hour parking restriction.
Goodlet — No system can work without restrictions.
Cleave — I don't think it has had a fair trial yet.
Goodlet — What can I tell our association?
Cleave — Tell them we'll consider the plan. I've heard people say they like shopping better now than before.

Hill — I think we should listen to the merchants and give their plan a trial.
Decided not to issue a taxi licence to Fred Leeder operator of the Glen Taxi.
Mr. Leeder had applied for a licence, saying that there had been friction with local taxis over him picking up passengers in town for the Glen. He had no intention, he said, of operating within the town limits. Constable Sheffield said that two charges, placed by local taxis, were pending now, but he didn't know what the court ruling would be. Reeve Marshall said he thought there were enough taxis now and Cr. Hill did not favour granting a licence to an out-of-town resident. Mr. Leeder said he was willing to have a clause in his licence that he would only pick up passengers for out-of-town delivery. Clarence Kennedy, a local taxman, said there was no by-law in any town stopping an out-of-town taxi from picking up fares under this condition, and with seven taxis and a bus he felt there was plenty of service without more.

Stan Allen was spokesman for a delegation of residents from the Alliance Paper Mill district complaining about odours from the mill waste which is dumped in the pits along Mill Road. He asked council to enforce the by-law and take action, which the previous council wouldn't take, to force the mill to treat its waste and put it through the sewerage system.
Cleave — That was tried, but it didn't work. Engineers say, I understand, was to get information about treating the waste.

Allen — (Mr. Mayor) Gibbons and I both told you before it was that it would take care of the

waste. If it won't the town should sue the contractor. We had a promise a year ago that engineers were at Alliance working on a filter bed.
Cleave — We're keeping after Haged to give us an answer. I'm still of the opinion that the waste can be analyzed and the situation solved.

Alex MacLaren, whose property adjoins the dumping area, said he had written the company several times and had had no satisfying answer. The engineer claimed it was never in the contract. The Dept. of Health would take no action because the waste was not a health menace. The same situation had been dealt with in other places, and could be solved here, he felt.

Hale — There is a filter bed at the Provincial mill, but the latex which is left in the fluid makes it impossible to put it in sewers and it still has to be dumped in the creek.
Allen — I suggest pressure be put on the mill by council.
Hill — Council should go after it and follow it through.

Marshall — Providing we can ascertain that it can be treated, we should get tough.
Cleave — I agree with Mr. Marshall. I promise Mr. Allen we'll keep him informed and do everything we can to bring it to a head this year.

Accepted the application of Charles Parker, from three applicants, for the position of caretaker of the Municipal Building at a salary of \$50 monthly.
(Moved by Hill and MacDonald.)

Set Daylight Saving Time in town for the same period as in Toronto, commencing April 29th.
(Moved by Petch and Tuck.)

Granted permission to the IODE to hold a tag day for the blind on April 29th.

Were informed by Norman Snyder that because of unforeseen difficulties, he was withdrawing an offer to haul garbage to a dump outside town. He will tender if the job should be advertised in the future.

A letter from the United Church board which administers Cedarvale School objected to any plan to dump garbage on property near the school. Council has not yet looked over any site in that vicinity and withheld an opinion until this is done.

Discussed the possibility of a plan, proposed by Reeve Marshall to set truck load limits on King and Queen Streets, as heavy trucks are damaging the pavements.

Will ask the CNR to provide cinders if possible to help fix the roadway over the tracks.

Cr. Hale asked on behalf of two King Street residents for removal of dead trees and this will be done. He also mentioned a broken cable on the highway bridge beside Saxe Motors and the mayor said this was being repaired. The question of relief for a local family, which he brought up, was found to be the responsibility of the township, as they had been living in Glen Williams for the winter.

Voted down a motion to grant the Recreation Commission the \$1600 salary of the Director.
(Moved by Hill and Marshall. Recorded vote, all others voted against.)

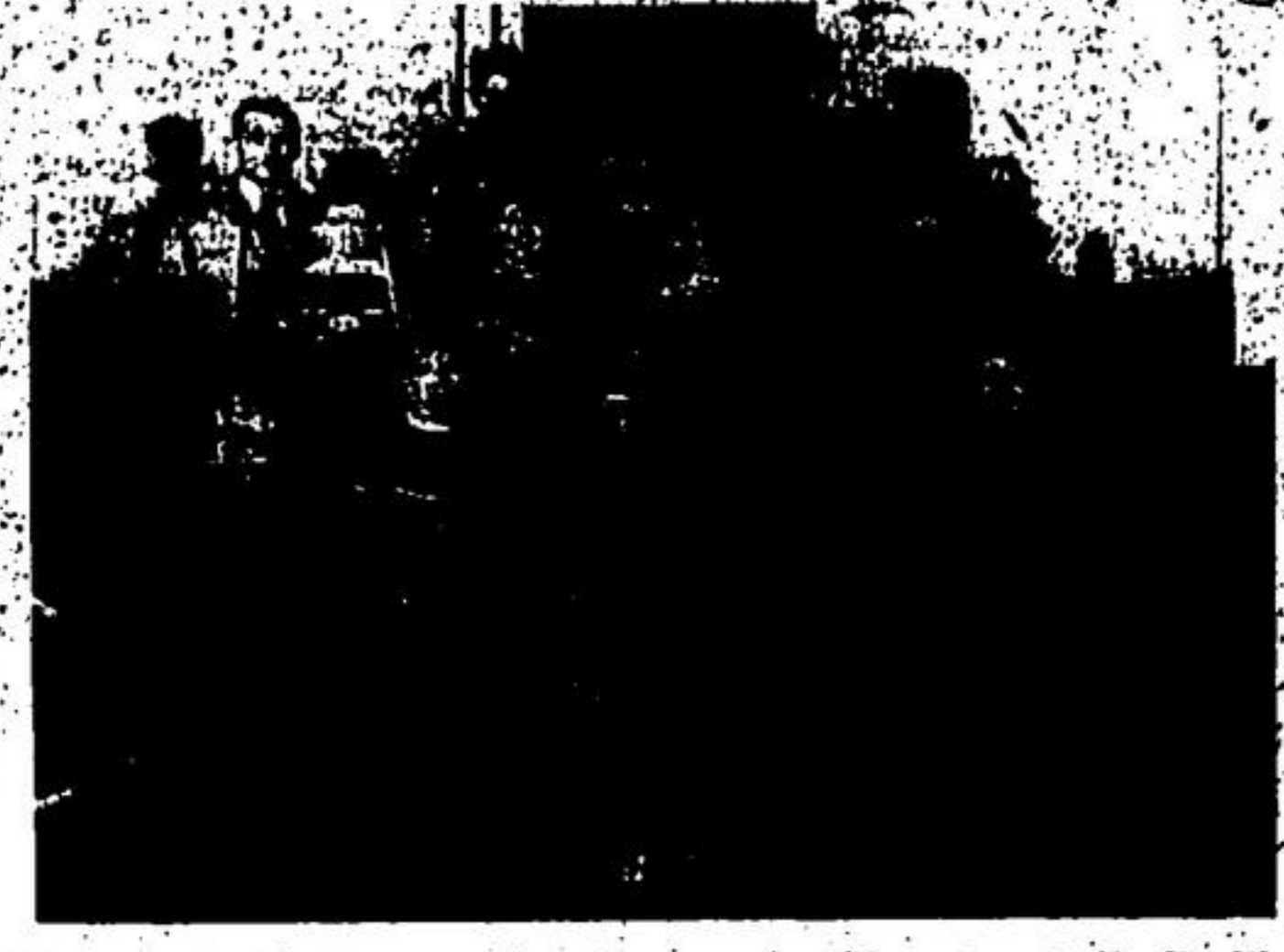
Cr. Hill said that since a Finance Committee meeting at which the request had been turned down, he had been talking to various citizens who think GRC is doing a good job. There are good men at the head of it and he would hate to see it disbanded. An expenditure of \$5390 is planned this year. The motion would provide about \$800 above the \$400 grant already included in the budget. He thought GRC was just as necessary as schools.

Reeve Marshall said he favoured keeping expenditures at a minimum, but there was quite an agitation for the grant, though where the money would come from is a question. The three heads of GRC had said they were through unless the grant is made.

Cleave — Do you want to change the mill rate to 69?
Hill — No.
McGillivray — I suggested giving the GRC more before the budget was struck, but council couldn't see it that way. Are we going to budget for a deficit now?

Cleave — GRC is doing a good job and I'm not complaining of their work. They did a good job last year with \$400. No other organ-

At present the two-hour parking by-law is not being enforced, but the police feel that if motorists do not cooperate it will be necessary to again resort to "chalking" in order to solve crowded parking conditions.

FOURTEENTH STRAIGHT WIN RAIDERS BEAT LAKEFIELD

H. M. Stewart Dies Was Bank Manager

A retired Bank of Commerce manager, Henry Malcolm Stewart died at his home on Durham Street on Monday. He had been an invalid since he suffered a serious stroke two years ago last October.
Mr. Stewart was born at Ealing, England 70 years ago. He came to Canada in 1891 and secured employment with the Bank of British Columbia at Victoria, B.C. The bank was later amalgamated with the Bank of Commerce and Mr. Stewart served as manager at various cities in the west, including Medicine Hat, Alta., and Moose Jaw, Sask. He later was manager at St. John's Newfoundland and Chatham, Ontario, where he retired in 1929. He moved to Lakefield and to Georgetown in 1944, where he purchased a house at Wildwood from the late D. W. Baxter. A year ago the property was sold to Earl Trow and Mr. and Mrs. Stewart moved to Georgetown, purchasing a house formerly owned by Barry Clarke.
He was a member of the Church of England. In his younger days he was a keen horseman and played polo.
He is survived by his wife, whom he met and married in Vermillion, Alta., two sons, Eric and Athol of Montreal, both of whom served overseas with the Canadian army, and two daughters, Mrs. Don Strickland (Helen) of Unionville and Phyllis M. of Toronto. There are five grandchildren. Two brothers live in England, Walter at Paldington, Devonshire and Alan at Wimbledon. Three brothers predeceased him.
The funeral service will be conducted in St. John's Church, Lakefield, tomorrow afternoon with interment following in Lakefield Cemetery.
