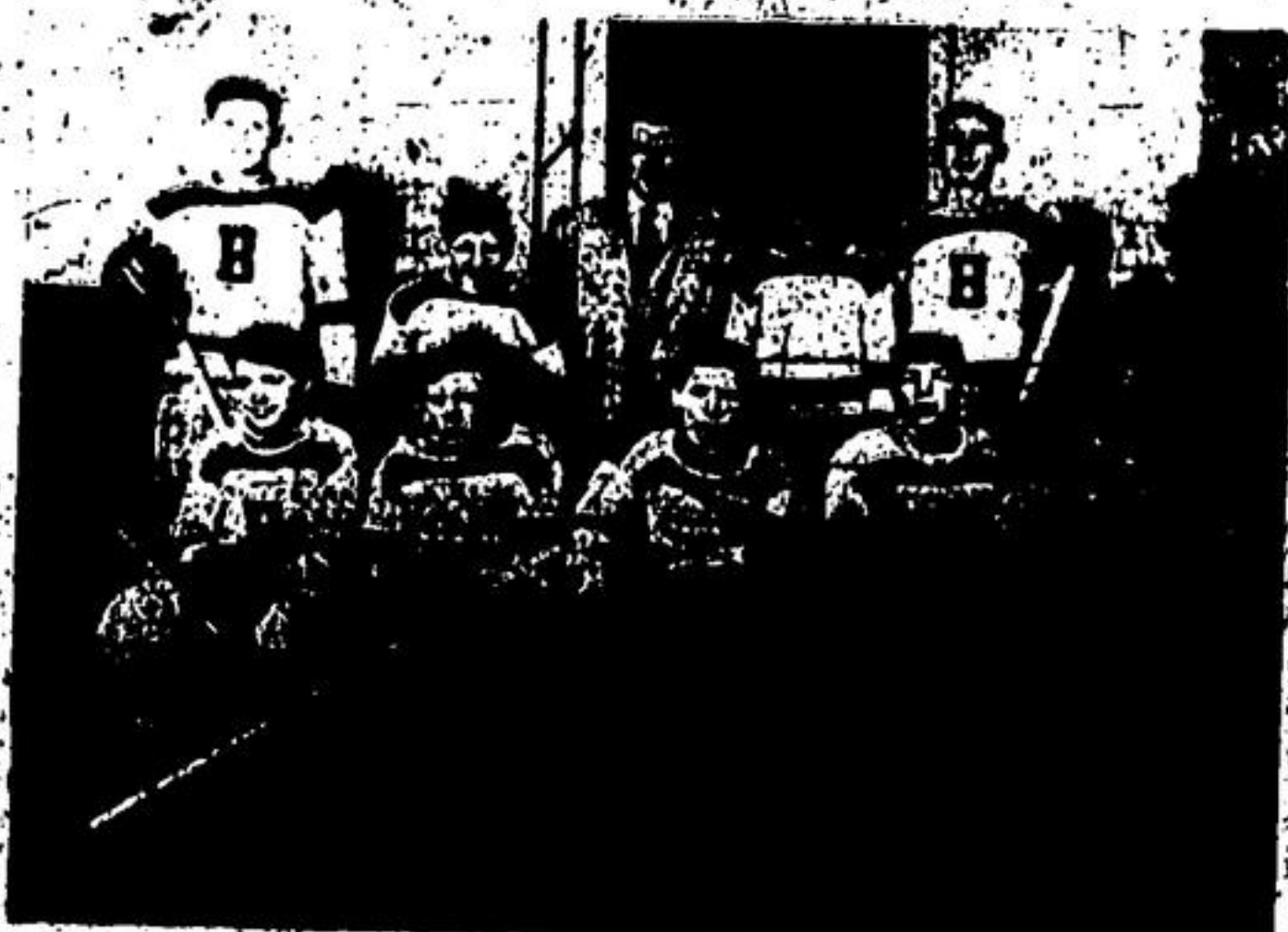


**HERSHEY BEARS ARE BANTAM CHAMPIONS**

**Toronto Man Wins \$500 Hockey Bond**

Edward Large, 81 Springmount Ave., Toronto, holding ticket number 61 is winner of the Hockey Club draw for a \$500 bond. Mr. Large's ticket was drawn by Mayor Harold Cleave at the hockey game last night. Present for the ceremony which took place on the ice between periods were president Bob Lane, vice president Frank Murfin, Jack Gunning, and Jack Armstrong, who introduced the mayor.

Over 700 of the 1000 tickets printed for the draw were sold. It had originally been hoped to sell all the tickets in town and district, but when the club executive realized that this would not be possible, some were sold in other centres. The money will be used to help defray costs of an expensive hockey season when gate receipts have not been high enough to cover the operating costs.

**Glen Flood is Worst in History**

One of the most serious floods in the history of Glen Williams occurred yesterday. The Credit branch which flows through the village was swollen by heavy rains and washed out the small bridge on Main Street past the dam. The dam itself suffered heavy damage. A tree, carried by the swift water, lodged at one corner and destroyed the foot bridge over the dam. At the corner of the dam nearest St. Alban's Church, earth gave way and part of the river took a course through this new opening. The dam abutments weakened and it was feared for a time that it would collapse, and the abutments of the new bridge on Main Street were also weakened.

School was called off today because the basement of the United Church, where one class meets was flooded. The 9th Line road was covered with water and this morning it was impossible to use it. The flats across from Preston's Grocery Store were flooded.

Extensive damage was caused at the Beaumont Knitting Mills where the basement was flooded as well as the boiler room. The plant is operating at half capacity.

At last reports, the flood seemed to have passed its peak. Older residents of the Glen claim it is the worst flood they have ever experienced, and the water is even higher than the last big flood in 1911.
