At a Court of Revision held before the council meeting to hear appeals against the 1950 assessment, the assessments of Gordon Davidson and Herbert Moreton were sustained.

A representative of the Dept. of Lands & Forests attended the meeting to discuss distribution of pheasants in 1950.

A number of small taxes were written off. These included: Olive Logan, \$3.97, sold to School Area Board; Robert Storr, \$2.77, assessed twice; Allan Banks, \$2.99, wrongly assessed. Clem Lusty was refunded \$5.95 on 1949 taxes paid, being an error in the assessment.

Road accounts paid were \$2836 and Relief \$90.
