ARTHUR JEPSON DIES, WAS ILL TWO YEARS

Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson conducted a funeral service yesterday at the McClure Funeral Home for Arthur Jepson who died on Sunday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Hugh Dickie after an illness of two years. Interment was made in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown and pallbearers were Harry Logan, Joseph Hall, Harold Cleave, Bernard Knight, Jack Evans and James Roe.

Mr. Jepson was born near Newark, Notts, England in 1872. He came to Canada in 1910 and settled at Caledon East, moving to Georgetown in 1916. He worked for the Canadian National Railways and later was employed as a grower at the greenhouse on King Street operated by Messrs. S. Kirk and D. McIntyre.

He is survived by four daughters, Mrs. Harry Hooton (May) and Mrs. Herbert Flint (Eva) of Farndon, Notts, England, Mrs. Hugh Dickie (Florrie) and Mrs. Jack McGibbon (Edna) and one son, Robert of Georgetown. He was predeceased by his wife, the former Lily Foster in 1946 and a son Neville in 1935. Six grandchildren live in England and four in Georgetown and there is one great-grandchild.
