A former Georgetown man, James Arthur Bird died in Toronto last Thursday, April 13th. Rev. Carman Hill conducted the funeral service on Saturday at the Jerrett Funeral Chapel and interment was made in Prospect Cemetery. Pallbearers were his brothers, Herbert, Lorne and Wilfrid Bird, Thomas Brownridge, Jim Fisher and Cecil Wilson. Mr. Bird was a son of the late James H. Bird and Annie Cook and was born 47 years ago at Meadowvale. He farmed in Esquewaug on the 8th Line and the 8th Line, then moved to Georgetown where he was in the real estate business. He had an office on Mill Street and the family lived in the house on Edith Street now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Petch. Moving to Warton, he was partner with his brother Howard in a dairy business. He lived in Owen Sound for a short time, then moved to Toronto where he was employed with the Bockner Seating Company. He leaves his wife, the former Aileen Hume, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Hume of town, and four children, Ruth, Donald, Douglas and Roy. There are four brothers, Lorne, who farms on the home farm on the 5th Line, Wilfrid, near Georgetown, Herbert, of Palermo, and Howard in the west. A sister, Elma, Mrs. Thomas Brownridge, predeceased him.
