## Raiders Win Int. 'B' Championship

### Take Four Straight from Bucko's Beavers, Ex-Champs

Although the Intermediate 'B' championship was almost a certainty after the Raiders had trounced Sundridge in three straight games, the majority of fans were not expecting an end to the series last Saturday. Everyone thought Bucko McDonald's Beavers would take at least one game on home ice before giving up the ghost for this season. But the Raiders did it again and with a 6-3 win completed an impressive playoff record of twenty straight wins.

Ever since the Raiders were christened by a Brantford radio announcer during a broadcast of the Intermediate A playoffs back in 1947, the erstwhile Papermakers have been providing the best in hockey. Brantford won that series, though Georgetown spoiled one planned civic reception by unexpectedly winning what the Brants thought would be the final game on their home ice. The next year, Brantford won before a powerful local team which took the cup, then played a series for the eastern championship with Dolbeau (Que.) Beavers. Last year, Sundridge won in a hard-fought series and this time the tables were turned.

Finalists four times and champions twice. Good hockey in any man's country.

**Raiders File Up Lead**

The first period left no doubt about the outcome of the game as Raiders piled up five goals to the home team's single. The game was fast right from the opening whistle and after six minutes of see-saw play, Nick Ferri got his first of a trio of goals when he scored on a pass from Leigh Bradbury. Lang scored Beavers' only goal of the period to tie the score briefly, then Raiders took over.

Ferri scored again with Chappel scoring seconds later. Towards the period end Junior Beaumont notched a nice goal and Ferri and Bradbury teamed again for Georgetown's fifth score.

**Junior Makes It Six**

Junior Beaumont increased the Georgetown lead when he scored on a pass from Max Bradbury early in the second period. Christie evened the scoring for the period at the fourteen minute mark when he combined with Hill for the second Sundridge goal.

**Sundridge Goalie Good**

In the third period Georgetown outscored Sundridge both in play and shots on goal, but the good work of goalie Schade kept them scoreless. Sedore slipped one past Lawrence for the final goal half way through the period but the tired old man from the north could not rally his team to overcome the lead which Raiders had piled up in the first.

**A Good Series**

In spite of the fact that Sundridge was beaten in four straight games, there can be nothing but respect for a good team which fought hard all the way. Bucko McDonald hasn't lost any of the hockey sense which made him a big league star and it is truly amazing the stamina which he shows, playing at an age when most of his teammates have long since hung up their skates for good. He had a good team and they gave the fans their money's worth in every game. Perhaps we'll see the same two teams battling it out again next season. If so, we will know that it won't be any push-over as long as Bucko is at the helm.

**Coach Gets Credit**

A good team is only as good as its coach and Georgetown got a gold mine when Ken Brathwaite took over the helm this year. From a team which looked only average at the start of the season, he developed one of the smoothest-clicking, high-scoring aggregations to ever grace intermediate hockey circles. They had their ups and downs. They didn't win all the games. Of twenty games in the regular schedule, 4 were lost and 3 tied. Two out of 20 exhibition games went to the other team.

But there was a steady improvement and the 20-win playoff record was the pay-off. Hats off to you, Coach Brathwaite, and to every star player on a championship team.

### Benefit Hockey Game Held For Young Local Athlete

#### Raiders Play Junior A Champs — Raise \$963 for Donnie Herrington

Well over \$900 will be turned over to Donnie Herrington, young Georgetown baseball pitcher and hockey star who left for Weston San today for treatment of a bone disease. The money was raised at a benefit hockey game last night, promoted by the Hockey Club and total receipts amounted to \$963. Donnie, an employee of Provincial Paper, Ltd., and only son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Herrington, Main Street South, has been laid up for several months and at present is in a cast from the waist down. In and out of hospital several times since last fall, the disease has finally been determined and he will get the best of treatment during his stay at Weston.

The cheque was presented to him early this afternoon by Hockey Club president Bob Lane.

**No Expenses Incurred**

The grand thing about last night is that every penny from sale of tickets will go to young Don. At first it was arranged with Guelph Biltmores that the expenses of their bus transportation would be paid, but that club refused to take anything. In fact, the players, noting that there was not a full house for the game offered to take up a collection themselves to add to the total, an offer which was refused with thanks. The Board of Parks donated the arena, the Raiders gave their services gratis, OHA referees Jack Shropshire (a former Raider) and Andy Bellemere made no charge for their trip from Toronto and Tony Gregg, new 2nd vice president of the OHA, came from Wingham to be master of ceremonies.

### OBA Schedule Will Be Drawn Monday

At a meeting next Monday in Milton, Town Hall, schedules for this season of the Ontario Baseball Association will be drawn up. Intermediate, juvenile, mid-age and bantam teams will compete. Georgetown Recreation Commission is entering teams in the three minor categories, with the intermediate club providing coaching support.

Saturday a meeting was held at Hawthorne Inn, at which Bob Lane of Georgetown was chosen vice president to replace Fred Dockens of Acton who had resigned.

Two minor teams have been admitted to the league, Clarkson and Campbellville. A special fee of \$7.50 plus \$15 for a default was made for these teams. Regular entry fees are \$30 and \$50 for a default.

On Friday the annual meeting of Georgetown Baseball Club has been called for the Rose Room at 8 p.m. Bud Corbett of Oakville, who for many years has played a leading part in promoting minor hardball in Ontario will be a speaker at the meeting. A promising team is shaping up for this season and many players who have not donned a uniform for a few seasons are showing an interest in trying for spots on the team.

**Del Beaumont Gets Award**

A highlight of the evening was the announcement that Del Beaumont, veteran Raider forward had been voted by his team-mates as the most valuable player on this year's champion team. He will receive the OHA trophy, one of which is awarded to each club in OHA competition.

**No Match for Biltmores**

Raiders proved to be no match for the Biltmores, Ontario Junior A champions who lost to Montreal in the Eastern Canada finals. Coached by Alf Pike, the Guelph team are younger, faster, better conditioned, and used to a much more rugged brand of hockey than we find among the Intermediate "B" simon puffs. The final score was 3-2. It could have been higher, but the visitors contented themselves with riding easy in the last period and displaying some of the fancy work which brought them a championship. Goalie Mooney, who makes a specialty of turning his back to the playing surface to follow the puck behind the net, skated up the ice with the team for the last few minutes and got a big hand from the crowd.

**Lots of Action**

The game was fairly close until the second period. Chappel and Ferri gave Georgetown the lead with the first goal of the game and Guelph tied 2-1 at the period end. Ferri tied it up, Chappel and Del Beaumont assisting, early in the second, then Biltmores turned on the power and rapped in five goals to win handily. They added another late in the third period. Raiders had the better of the play in this frame but couldn't seem to get the puck past Mooney. Leigh Bradbury and Dickenson tangled in the second and were banished to the cooler for five minutes.
