## Crossed Atlantic By Sailing Ship F. Appleyard Dies

Frederick William Appleyard, a former resident of Glen Williams, died at his home at Crewson's Corners on Tuesday, April 18th in his 86th year. Mr. Appleyard was born on August 9th, 1864, at Market Rasen, Lincolnshire, England. He came to Canada on a sailing ship in 1882 and secured employment as a moulder in a present city hall in Toronto. While there he attended the first Canadian National Exhibition.

After a few years he returned to England where he owned and operated his own foundry. Returning to Canada in 1910 he was employed in Toronto as a master moulder. He was back to England several times and in 1914 brought his family to this country and settled in Toronto. During the first Great War he returned to England and worked as a moulder of munitions. Coming back to Canada after the war he moved his family to Glen Williams where they made their home for the next sixteen years.

For the last eighteen years he had lived in this district, often coming back to the Glen for visits. In all he made nine round trips to England and in his love of travel he had crossed Canada from coast to coast. His chief hobby in later years was "hitch-hiking" for the pleasure of talking to new people and he had hundreds of motorist friends, some of whom came to enquire about him at the time of his illness, such was his friendly personality.

He was an enthusiastic gardener and loved his flower garden which was a great source of admiration among his neighbours. He was a member of the Church of England and the Orange Order.

Mr. Appleyard is survived by his wife, formerly Elizabeth Anne Davy, three daughters, Mrs. A. Smith (Dora Kate), Glen Williams, Mrs. H. Stull (Freda), Milton and Mrs. Earl Marchmont (Joyce), Glen Williams and five sons Eric William, Guelph, Fred Godaal, Georgetown, Donald, Acton, Ralph, Gananoque, and Alan, Oshawa. A brother Walter lives in Glasgow, Scotland, and a sister, Hannah, in Australia.

Rev. W. G. Luxton conducted the funeral service at the Rumley Funeral Home, Acton, on Friday. Pallbearers were his sons, Ted, Donald, Ralph and Alan and his sons-in-law, Howard Stull and Earl Marchmont. Interment was made in Glen Williams Cemetery.
